BROSS HANGS K. O. ON HIS OPPONENT IN BOUT AT BELT

Great Falls Middleweight Gets Victory in Ninth Start of Fistic Career.

In the ninth start of his fistic career, Pete Bross, Great Falls middleweight, added another K. O. to his list and sent Bill Savage, Cleveland middleweight, to the canvas for the count of 10 in the fifth round of a scheduled 12 round fight in the headline event of a card at Belt Monday afternoon. Bross went after his man with a vengeance and after feeling him out carefully in the first two rounds went after him in the third and fourth rounds and had him all but out when the bell rang ending the fourth frame. Bross knocked him down once in the fourth round with a terrific jolt to the jaw and in the fourth round dropped him four times with hard lefts to the jaw and body.

Bross Plays for Body.
Savage fought a different fight at Belt than he fought in Great Falls on June 20, but he was fighting a different boy and did not have a chance with Bross. Bross played for the Cleveland lad's body more than he did in their previous fight and wore the eastern lad down with hard body drives. Bross weakened the Cleveland battler with the same punch Jack Dempsey used when he weakened Georges Carpentier in their fight at Jersey City. The Frenchman stated after the fight that rabbit punch used by Dempsey took his vitality away and those at the ringside at Belt saw Savage suffer the same experience. After hammering the eastern lad with the rabbit punch, Bross followed him with lefts and rights to the head and body until the Cleveland was on the point of going out. He was dropped four times in the following round before he was counted out.

Opened Fairly Even.
The opening rounds were fairly even but Bross had a shade and it was apparent that the fight was going to end in a K. O. for the Great Falls lad. Savage elected to do some leading in the first and second round and was willing to stand and mill it with the Great Falls middleweight, but he was against too good a boy and could not stand his terrific punches. Bross uncorked a wonderful left that surprised those who have seen him in his last fight and marveled at the way he used it. He put the Cleveland boy away with a terrific left kidney punch following a number of rights and lefts to the jaw and body.

Decision Given LaDue.
"Kid" Harrison failed to come back in his fight with Frankie LaDue, Great Falls lightweight. Harrison is an old timer in the ring and sought to stage a comeback against the Great Falls boy, but LaDue checked his aspirations and was awarded a referee's decision over the Mexican lightweight, who in his prime was one of the best boys on the southern Pacific coast. LaDue showed a marked improvement over the fighting in former bouts but was at a disadvantage because the Mexican chose to hang on throughout the entire contest. The crowd, however, numbered in the thousands and after each lead by LaDue the Mexican would fall into a clinch and failed to show as fans had considered he should show against LaDue.

Bantam Fight Thriller.
The preliminary between Andy Chaney and Stewart McPherson, Great Falls bantamweights, proved to be next to none but the headline event and the bout was a thriller from the opening gong until the final round was ended. McPherson was given the decision but only after taking considerable punishment from his opponent. Chaney appeared to be outweighed a number of pounds but the boys scaled about the same. The bout was filled with action and met with the approval of the fans. In the other preliminary John Bachman, a Belt welterweight, knocked out Harry Browning, another Belt boy, in the second round. Bachman was far too hard a puncher for his opponent and sent him to the canvas with a series of hard body and head punches.

INDEPENDENCE HANDICAP WON BY EXTERMINATOR



New Track Record Marks Opening Day of Grand Circuit

North Randall, Cleveland, Ohio, July 4.—The grand circuit harness horse racing season of 1921 opened at North Randall, Monday. Close finishes, fast time and a large first day crowd marked the event.

One track record went by the boards. In winning the Edwards stake for 2:08 pacers, the feature event on the card, Prince Lorse, the doublegaited champion of the world, paced the second heat in 2:02 3/4, half a second faster than the previous record for the state established by Game of Chance in 1918.

The winner is owned by Captain David Shaw and was driven by Mike McDovitt.
