New York, July 12.—A Washington policeman was in New York Tuesday seriously considering his chances of winning the world's heavyweight boxing championship from Jack Dempsey. He is Henry Darnelle, 21 years old, the undefeated heavyweight champion of the United States navy destroyer fleet during the war but otherwise unknown in boxing circles.
