British Factories Use Oil Burners to Help Coal Shortage... London, June 23.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The coal shortage here has developed into a trial of strength. The importation of foreign coal, chiefly American, continues on a large scale, says the American chamber of commerce in London. The shortage of coal, the report continues, has resulted in a rush to convert coal to oil-burning installations. Mills, railways, breweries and electric power stations are being steadily recruited to this system but in many of the cases the conversion from coal to oil is only of a temporary nature. Wage reductions are being effected. The wages of 1,250,000 workers were reduced during April 900,000 of these reductions being due to the operation in the cost of living scale. Increases in wages were received by 18,000 workers.

ANTI OCCUPATION SENTIMENT STRONG IN PRUSSIAN TOWNS... Dusseldorf, Germany.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The anti-occupation sentiment is much stronger in Dusseldorf, Ruhrort and Duisburg, the cities of Rhenish Prussia recently occupied by the French, than in Mayence, Coblenz and Cologne, which also have been under foreign occupation for more than two years by the French, American and British. As one crosses from the left bank of the Rhine and enters recently occupied territory, the mood of the population becomes more sullen, their behavior more aloof and their hatred much more pronounced. The reason may be that the French are occupying the part of the right bank of the Rhine that they hold near the Ruhr in real military fashion and the occupation is much more severe than that on the left bank. The hatred of the population is directed more especially against the French and children are being brought up in a constant terror and undisguised scorn of the occupying French. The little romance that the real brotherly love between French and Germans will be achieved with the coming generation.

Occupations bring out the wily sides of the occupied populations and books have been written about the good jokes which the Belgians perpetrated on the Germans when they were ruling their country by force of arms. The Germans are now in the same position toward the French as the Belgians were toward them and they are failing to do a little romance that the real brotherly love between French and Germans will be achieved with the coming generation.

Schooner Polar Bear First to Ascend Kilyma River for Four Years. Juneau, Alaska.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Points more than 500 miles up the Kilyma river of northern Siberia, which had not been visited by aptly named "four years" before, reached here by a party of American traders, headed by Captain S. K. Gudmundson, master of the trader schooner Polar Bear, according to word received here on August 4. The Bear sailed from the Siberian coast and East Cape into the Arctic and arrived at the mouth of the Kilyma while the traders took the small boat up the river 120 miles and anchored August 4. The schooner was worked 300 miles further up.

"We were still 400 miles from the head of the river," Captain Gudmundson said in writing of his trip to a news friend. "We found trading very good as no boat had visited that vicinity in four years and we soon disposed of our wares and loaded up with goods of the country."

Last winter the Polar Bear and its company was frozen in at the mouth of the Kilyma, having failed in an attempt to reach Nome before the ice came. Her cargo of furs and ivory will be taken to Nome this spring and shipped out to Seattle.

Avoid Overt Insults... The entrance of a party of French officers in a beer garden causes the center of the wine glasses to be set on a point and surrounding tables to be vacated as promptly as they were by Belgians in their cafes when German officers came marching in. Overt insults are avoided as carefully as they were in Belgium but acts of contravention with the decrees of the occupying forces are treated by the French as they were by the Germans in Belgium. Fines are imposed in marks. The Belgians and the French suffered occupation of territory more stoically than the Germans and with less severity. The owner of the Grand hotel recently requisitioned in Dusseldorf for the general staff of General Degoutte, the French commander, wept bitter tears as he departed from his home.

Discrimination... A salesman recently told the Bow Street magistrate that no swearing is allowed nowadays in Covent Garden Market. This exclusion of all gollers, raterays and spring-cleaning victims is surely rather drastic.—Punch (London).
