Officials Will Seize All Booze Crossing Canadian Boundary

Washington, July 15.—Shipments of intoxicating liquors entering the ports of the United States or crossing the Canadian or Mexican borders without a prohibition permit are subject to seizure by customs officers under orders effective Friday. There is still some uncertainty on the part of the customs service as to how it shall regard liquor in the bars of foreign passenger liners hitherto considered as "sea stores," also what attitude to adopt in connection with liquors carried by a foreign ship for use only of its crew.

FOOT AILMENTS TOPIC OF TALK AT CLUB LUNCH

Representative of Manufacturer of Appliance Talks to Advertising Men.

Informative advertising was demonstrated to the Great Falls Ad club's luncheon at Hotel Rainbow Friday, in an illustrated lecture by C. E. Anderson, representing the Scholl Manufacturing Co. The company manufactures foot appliances and, remaining well without the field of commercialism, Mr. Anderson gave a lecture on foot ailments that dealt exhaustively with the pedal discomforts of humanity. "The housewife takes an average of 4,000 steps a day and if she weighs 150 pounds her feet support a total of 225 tons before she retires," said the speaker. "But there is no reason why the feet should give her any more trouble than her hands. Nine of every 10 people have foot trouble, and the fault almost invariably lies with an improperly fitted shoe. A shoe frequently wears out improperly, but the foot, not the shoe, should be corrected. Causes of Foot Ills. "Change from one pair of high heels to another very frequently results in foot ailments. Bunions are almost invariably caused by shoes too short for the foot. I believe the day is near when to be permitted to fit a shoe, a clerk will pass an examination. The system is now in effect with horse-shoers in some state and there is no reason why the human family should not receive the same consideration. "To fit a shoe, it is necessary to take measurements. The length and width must be determined, as well as the height of the heel. It is vastly better to prevent than to cure. My parting advice is to wash your feet—wash them every day. Not 15 per cent of the population washes its feet every day. It's one of the best preventatives of foot trouble known."

Mr. Anderson was brought to Great Falls by the firm of Flaherty & Perra, and devoted all of his time to delivering educational lectures. About 20 doctors attended the luncheon as guests of the firm. Mail Wagon Driver Is Killed; Result of Family Feud, Belief

Council Bluffs, Ia., July 15.—Walter Baldwin, 45, mail wagon driver, was shot by an unknown assassin late Thursday night and died Friday morning. Baldwin was attacked while en route to the post office with a wagon load of mail. A woman saw Baldwin's body half dragging and half hanging from the mail wagon and notified the police. The mail wagon lock had not been molested, the would-be mail robber having apparently taken fright and run away. Incoherent statements made by the widow, who appears in a state of delirium, indicating that the shooting may have been the result of a family feud, are being closely investigated by the authorities, several members of the family having been called into the case and their statements taken.
