

# MRS. KABER IS FOUND GUILTY, GIVEN LIFE TERM

## DEFENDANT HEARS VERDICT WHILE HALF UNCONSCIOUS; CARRIED FROM COURT ROOM

### Conviction Carries No Hope for Pardon as Ohio Law Provides Against Clemency; Woman Who Caused Assassination of Husband Has Eat Nothing; Continues in Stupor.

Cleveland, July 16.—Mrs. Eva Catherine Kaber was Saturday found guilty of murder in the first degree, but with a recommendation of mercy by the jury which tried her on a charge of plotting the killing of her husband, Daniel F. Kaber. Under the verdict Mrs. Kaber must serve the remainder of her life in prison.

Before the jury reported officially to the court, Judge Maurice Bernon announced the decision to Attorney Francis W. Paulson, Mrs. Kaber's personal counsel, so that he might inform Mrs. Kaber in the hope that she would revive sufficiently from a stupor to be brought into court to hear the official announcement. She had been in a stupor all the morning.

### Given Life Sentence.

Mrs. Kaber was sentenced to life imprisonment in the Ohio reformatory for women at Marysville. Under the Ohio law there is no hope for pardon under such a verdict.

The jury resumed its deliberations Saturday morning, having failed to return a verdict Friday night after having the case four hours.

Mrs. Kaber was said by her attorneys to have been practically unconscious all of last night. She had been carried from the court room and had not eaten during the day.

The jury began balloting just two years from the time Mr. Kaber was stabbed to death, by assassins, alleged to have been hired by Mrs. Kaber. Though Mrs. Kaber was suspected of being implicated in her husband's death at the time, insufficient evidence was found then by officials on which to formally charge her with the crime.

### Falls Into Trap.

For two years Mr. Kaber, the aged father of the murdered man, doggedly kept working on the mystery with the aid of private detectives, suspicion pointing stronger and stronger toward Mrs. Kaber.

Finally a brother of Mrs. Kaber was brought in as a ruse and her mother, Mrs. Mary Brickel, who was suspected of knowing much about them, was led to believe that the son was to be charged with the crime. The ruse worked as it had been planned. Mrs. Brickel, to save the son, is alleged to have confessed, implicating her daughter, Mrs. Kaber; Miss Marian McArdie, daughter of Mrs. Kaber; herself and others.

The grandmother, daughter and grand-daughter were indicted for first degree murder, also Mrs. Ermia Colavito, mid-wife nurse, Salvatore Cata and Vittorio Pisselli, the latter two being charged with the actual murder.

All are on trial excepting Pisselli.

### "Slightest Indiscretion or Misrepresentation Might Cause Incalculable Harm," Declares Sir James Craig, Ulster Premier, in London, Summoned by Lloyd George, for Council.

London, July 16.—(By The Associated Press).—What is happening behind the scenes in the consultations of the Irish parties preliminary to the renewal of the conversations between Eamonn de Valera and Premier Lloyd George on Monday is screened by what Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, termed Saturday morning "a rigid silence." Sir James used this phrase in explaining to interviewers his belief that everything depended upon the way the question was handled.

"The slightest indiscretion or misinterpretation," he said, "may easily cause incalculable harm. What will best aid the attainment of peace is for everyone concerned to withhold comment outside of official consultations."

Of the principals in the conferences, Mr. Lloyd George is spending the weekend in his country home where members of the cabinet probably will be called.

Mr. de Valera and his colleague went Saturday afternoon to view the exhibition here of Sir John Lavery's paintings, which include pictures of the trial of Sir Roger Casement and of the funeral procession in London of Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork and a portrait of Archbishop Mannix of Australia.

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
