Federal State Aid Branded Bribe to Saddle Officeholding Class on Nation; State Crops Reviewed

State Bankers Listen to Ex-Governor Lowden Lambast Washington Bureaucrats, Then Hear Reports on Harvest Outlook Over Montana From Representatives of Financial Groups.

Helena, Aug. 5.—Federal aid is the bribe through which the bureaucrats at Washington obtain from the states new authority and it is the basis of propaganda designed to extend the power of these federal agencies into new fields.

His talk was on the need for reducing governmental expense—elimination of officers, bureaus and commissions, the organization of government on a basis where red tape can be minimized. He said that if the increase of public officers continues at the present rate, before long there will be two classes, one, the minority of office-holders, the other, the class that has to support them.

He blamed the popular appeal for a hand-out from the governmental treasuries for all sorts of local ventures as a big factor in the increase in expenditures of states and nation.

Roosevelt's Intervention in Russo-Japanese War Helped to Island Kingdom, Is Claim

Williamstown, Mass., Aug. 5.—Russo-Japanese War. Roosevelt's successful efforts to end the Russo-Japanese war was given to the institute of politics Friday by Baron Zergius A. Korff, former deputy governor general of Finland.

"Bad feeling between the two nations was intensified by the determination of some Russian adventurers aided and abetted by the czar to obtain concessions in Korea he said.

"The psychology of the czar in this case is explained by his absolute contempt of Japan, on the one hand and on the other hand by his conceit and conviction that he could do no wrong. This was one of the most pernicious of the influences of the kaiser which told in this case very strongly. Wilhelm was consciously and cleverly urging the czar onto such a conflict. His game was a sure one too, Germany could only win and Russia could only lose."

"Not doubting Roosevelt's sincerity, we can, however at present question his wisdom in forcing this peace upon Russia. Not that we could expect a victory or even military achievements, but Japan might have learned a lesson which would have changed much of the succeeding events through the world."

"The Russian army would never have been able to show much grit, but her internal troubles would have increased and forced the government to grant more reforms, establishing in a firmer way the principles of constitutional government for which she was quite ripe, but which neither the czar nor the ruling class were yet ready to grant. What they did grant they tried to take back as soon as the social discontent quieted down."

ARMY AND NAVY IS ONLY PLACE FOR REDUCING

Idaho Senator Demands Return of Troops Now in Germany.

Suggestions Offered in Support of Resolution to Lower Troops.

Washington, Aug. 5.—Reduction in army and navy expenditures is the only hope for reducing taxes, Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, declared in the senate Friday, supporting his resolution to cut the army from 150,000 to 100,000.

"There are no places where we can cut expenses to any appreciable extent except the army and navy," said Senator Borah. "If we are not willing to do that we might just as well tell the country that we will do very well if we hold expenditures and taxes where they are and that there is no hope for reducing taxes."

His proposed reduction in the army, Senator Borah said, would alone save \$50,000,000 to \$70,000,000. Senator Nelson, Republican, Minnesota, urged reduction also in "superfluous" officers. Senator Borah asked if it was "ludicrous" to have 14,000 officers for the present army of 150,000 men, adding that \$25,000,000 more might be saved by reducing the officer personnel.

Senator Borah interpolated a demand for return of the American troops in Germany.

Refers to Pledge. "One of the solemn pledges of the campaign" he said, "was that this army would be brought out of Europe just as soon as the new administration could issue the order. It was repeated more than once and is a matter that is within our power to fulfill. I would not ask if it conditions had changed but we are not informed that they have changed."

Expenses of about \$1,000,000 monthly for the troops in Germany are chargeable to that country, Senator Borah said, but are actually being borne by the American tax payers as Germany is unable to pay.

Spanish Forces Suffer Big Defeat in North Morocco

Madrid, Aug. 5.—Spanish forces have suffered a severe defeat in north-eastern Morocco where they have been resisting heavy attacks by rebellious tribesmen, it is declared by newspapers here. Advice received by La Voz state that Nador and Zelman which have been looked upon as keys of the Spanish situation before Melilla have been evacuated by the Spanish troops while another Moroccan prison is holding 5,000 Spanish prisoners for ransom.

The Moroccan situation has developed a political phase here and King Alfonso is said to have summoned his advisers.

SEVERE WINDSTORM CAUSES HEAVY LOSS TO CANADIAN CROPS
