HIGHEST DAIRY RATING IN STATE.

99, IS AYRSHIRE'S

State Veterinary Chief Congratulates H. B. Mitchell Equipment Perfect.

Special to The Tribune. Helena, Aug. 6.—That the Ayrshire dairy, one of the several supplying milk and cream to the people of Great Falls, is maintained in an almost perfect sanitary condition and has attained a higher rating than has ever been given to any other dairy in Montana, is shown by the records of the Montana livestock sanitary board.

An inspection of this dairy conducted July 16, 1921, developed a rating of 99 out of a possible 100. At the time the inspection was made, the dairy was maintaining 225 cows and was milking 115.

Attention to the excellence of this dairy is brought out in a letter to its owner, H. B. Mitchell, from Dr. W. J. Butler, state veterinary surgeon, and given out by the latter as follows:

"I cannot simply pass by the official score card of your dairy without writing you a letter of congratulation. Your score of 99 is the highest score that has ever been recorded in Montana. You are not only to be congratulated, but the citizens of Great Falls are to be congratulated on the fact that they have a dairy that absolutely scores perfect on equipment and only loses one point on methods, or which in its entirety scores 99 out of a 100.

Oil Magnate Fined \$25 at Billings as Hobo; Will Fight It

Billings, Aug. 6.—The claim of John Britt that he was president of the Montana Oil company, capitalized at \$250,000, with holdings near Wolf Point, did not save him from a fine of \$25 for vagrancy in police court. Britt's attorney announced that he will appeal the case to the district court and Britt gave bonds pending this action.

Officers who arrested the man claimed that he spent much time about a room where gambling was strongly suspected. Judge Mann declared that the evidence showed Britt was doing no oil business, despite the pocketful of credentials that he carried.

Final Exhibitions at Bozeman Hair-Raisers; 10,000 See Exciting Finish.

Bozeman, Aug. 6.—The third annual Bozeman roundup came to a close Saturday afternoon with a program that for excitement surpassed any in the history of the roundups. An audience of close to 10,000 people witnessed a regular hair-raising exhibition in bulldogging, calf roping, riding of wild steers and wild horses, and broncho bucking, in which rider after rider had narrow escapes from injuries.

The Great Falls members of the American Legion will gather at Veterans' hall next Friday to hear Mayor R. M. Armour explain the manner in which Dr. G. A. Fuson of Kalispell was appointed as public health physician to replace Dr. Aloysius Dolan. A committee was appointed at the last regular meeting of the legion to interview the mayor on the appointment and another to interview the city and county commissioners regarding the legislators' preference list passed by the legislature.

The public health physician under the present co-operative system with the federal government, is appointed by a committee composed of the mayor, chairman of the board of county commissioners and a representative of the Red Cross.

FIX COUNTY TAX LEVY AUGUST 8

Commissioners Delay Action Until Data is Received From State Board.

Inability of the state board of equalization to supply the necessary data to enable the board of county commissioners to determine the annual county and special school levies, has resulted in the postponement of the date of fixing the levies from Monday, Aug. 8, to Monday, Aug. 22.

In a communication received Saturday by the board of county commissioners, the state board of equalization announced that it was unable to complete and transmit to the county clerk, the assessments of railroads, telegraph, telephone and power transmission lines and other inter-county properties by Monday.

The state board also asks for deferment of the date of fixing the levies because it will not be able to transmit the adjustments and valuations to the county clerk and that it cannot hear and determine appeals from the action of the county boards. A similar communication has been sent to all county boards.

The commissioners Saturday virtually completed the work coming before them as a board of equalization, but because of the postponement of the levy fixing date, they expect to consider further protests Monday.

Submit Briefs on Cascade Sewer Bond Injunction Case

Counsel for H. W. Brown, who has instituted injunction proceedings against the town of Cascade to prevent the sale of \$30,000 worth of sewer bonds, and attorneys for the defendant town, were ordered to prepare briefs and submit them to the court within 10 days, at the conclusion of the hearings Saturday morning.
