EXPLORING HILLS FOR A NEW ROUTE Y. M. C. A. Secretary Will Try Short Cut to Benchmark Camp Ralph Wolfe, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and L. E. Hills will leave for the Y. M. C. A. boys' camp at Benchmark today (Sunday). Americanisation Secretary J. C. Reed will be in charge of the work at the association until Mr. Wolf returns. The two will leave early in the morning and drive as far as the Willow Creek ranger station, where they will get pack horses at the Brugger ranch and proceed 14 miles over the mountains into camp. "It will make a complete survey of the trail over which we will travel to determine the possibilities of the boys coming home that way," said Mr. Wolf. "The trail the boys were advised to take necessitated a hike 15 miles longer than this one. I believe the new way will prove all right and the boys will not be so tired when they arrive home." The trail the campers took led by the diversion dam, Allan's camp, Medicine hot springs and Lakeside ranger station, a distance of about 25 miles.
