

MEET TONIGHT TO PICK PAVING FOR 3RD AVE. SO.

Residents of District Must Choose; Opposition to Immediate Work Still Presses.

Choice of a material for the Third avenue south paving district and such action as may be taken by opponents of immediate construction to delay letting of a contract will be decided upon this (Saturday) evening at a meeting of interested property owners at 912 Third avenue south.

was announced by the chairman of the public improvement committee that a contract would be immediately let when the property owners had selected a paving type and it was requested that a selection be made this week.

Bids are Under Estimate. Property owners who oppose letting of the contract this fall intend to reassert their objections at the meeting and to organize to send a delegation to the council session next Monday.

Both opponents and proponents of immediate construction say no legal objection can be made now unless a technicality in the proceedings is discovered, but it is understood that it is optional with the council whether the contract is let this fall.

Choice of a material lies between reinforced concrete, bitulithic and Texico, the types designated in the specifications. Alderman G. A. Bosley of the Third ward stated in council last Monday that probably all but 1 per cent of the affected property owners would prefer reinforced concrete and the prediction was made Friday by other residents of the district that this material would be selected.
