### Opportune Havre Hits and Local Errors Give Bearcats Victory Here

**Armantage Twirls Finely but Support Was Not of Same Quality; Wind Makes First-Class Ball Impossible; Several Thrilling Plays.**

Jack Armantage twirled a good game for the Independents at Earling park Sunday afternoon against Bob Ingersoll's Havre Bearcats, striking out 16 and holding the Hill city players to four hits, but the Great Falls ball club emerged from the fray on the short end of a 5-to-3 score. Costly errors behind Armantage made it possible for the Havre aggregation to vanquish the Independents in the first game they have lost this season. Ingersoll opposed Armantage on the mound and hit more freely than Armantage, but got the breaks. The Havre hits came at opportune times, but the Independents were unable to bring them in when they got on the sacks. Adair, second baseman for the Independents, was the first man up in the last half to the frame and hit a clean double to left field, one of the cleanest hits of the game. Both teams went scoreless in the first inning, and the Hill city club was chalked up with another zero. The Independents scored two tallies in the first half of the second on a single by Lenihan, a pair of errors by Haas, Havre third baseman.

Neither side scored in the next inning, but each added a counter in the fourth. Havre scored on White's walk and Ingersoll's double.
