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Native Ducks Crowd Lakes of Montana, Says Game Warden

Montana sportsmen will enjoy the finest duck shooting in years during the coming season, it was announced in Helena Thursday by State Game Warden C. A. Jakways.

The number of native ducks has been steadily increasing since spring shooting was discontinued, Mr. Jakways said, and this year the apex has been reached.

There also are plenty of wild chickens of all kinds, the game warden said, but since the open season on these is confined to Flathead, Missoula, Lincoln and Sanders counties, there will be little shooting.

Deer and elk, he likewise reports, are doing excellently. Lewis and Clark, Powell and Missoula counties are the only counties where elk will be killed.

The open season for deer is from November 1 to December 1. The limit is one per season. Deer cannot be killed in Yellowstone, Rosebud, Custer, Powder River, Carter, Richland, Roosevelt, Dawson, Stillwater, Gallatin, Teton, Phillips, Garfield, Valley and certain portions of Fergus counties.

The open season for fur-bearing animals—marten, otter, fox, sable, muskrat and fisher—November 1 to April 1, following.

There is a permanent closed season on mountain sheep and mountain goats, quail, Chinese pheasant, Hungarian pheasant or partridge, wood duck, curlew, swan, loon and turtle dove.
