**PETITION FILED FOR INCREASED RATES ON GAS**

Great Falls Charges Less Than in Other Cities of State, Says Manager.

Petition of the Great Falls Gas Co. for permission to increase its rates to consumers in this city approximately 15 per cent was filed by the company with the state public service commission in Helena Monday.

**To Make Rate \$2.00.**

The present rate is \$1.95 per thousand feet for the first 10,000 cubic feet used by the consumer in one month, while a ten per cent reduction for payment before the tenth of the month, making a net rate of \$1.76. The rate proposed by the gas company in its petition proposes a flat \$2 rate per thousand for the first 10,000 with a penalty of 10 cents per thousand if the bill is not paid before the tenth of the month.

**Freight on Coal More.**

The Great Falls plant is using the same coal that is used in Butte, and we must pay \$2 more freight on it. Despite this difference Butte is paying 25 cents per thousand feet for its gas more than Great Falls consumers.

**HALF MILLION TONS OF HAY SURPLUS IN MONTANA WHICH MUST GO TO EASTERN MARKET**

An outside market sufficient to consume 500,000 tons of hay will be necessary this fall and winter to provide an outlet for Montana's hay surplus, in the opinion of F. W. Beier, agricultural statistician, representing the federal department of agriculture.

**Atlantic Coast Short.**

"The big shortage this year is in New York, Pennsylvania and the New England states," said Mr. Beier. Wisconsin has a shortage, too, and the Michigan and South Dakota crops are being carried over from last year.

**GRAIN HARVEST WILL BE OVER IN TWO WEEKS**

Bulk of Wheat and Other Cereals Will Be in Elevators or Otherwise Disposed of.

Within the next 10 days or two weeks the bulk of the grain in Montana will be in elevators or disposed of in one way or another, according to reports from various grain districts of the state.

**Yield Below Estimate.**

Reports from various parts of the state show that the yield is below the estimate placed a few weeks ago when it was stated that in many places wheat would go as heavy as 35 and 40 bushels to the acre.
