**INERADICABLE COAT OF TAN GAINED BY GIRL LOOKOUT FOR FIRES IN FOREST OF IDAHO**

Spending the entire day from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m., at the top of a scaffold it took a half hour to climb, and doing this regularly every day for two solid months, looking out for fires in a national forest in Idaho, gave Miss Violet Hewson, who went through Great Falls on Thursday on her way to Bonanza, Mont., a coat of tan that promises to stay with her for many months to come.

Miss Hewson, whose home is in Rolla, N. D., spent July and August in the capacity of official lookout for the department of forestry of the state of Idaho, to which position she was appointed by Forest Supervisor E. Grandjean. She was located at the Swan Hole lookout station, 83 miles from Boise, in the Boise national forest. The lookout post which she occupied all day long for the two months was 9,000 feet above sea level, and required a climb of half an hour to be reached.

Miss Hewson had one companion to relieve the monotony of her vigil, Miss Eula Morton, of Marshall, Ill., who went through this city with Miss Hewson Thursday. Miss Morton was bound for Libby, where she will teach school. Miss Hewson will teach at Homestead.

During the time she was on guard Miss Hewson discovered and reported nine fires, the largest covering 160 acres. The largest covering 160 acres, the first official woman lookout in Idaho. During her two months' experience she lost 21 pounds, she says, and attributes this to the half hour climb up and down the scaffold daily. Miss Morton, her companion, who stayed at the bottom of the lookout station and did the housekeeping and cooking, gained 12 pounds.


