OCTOBER LIMIT ON DELINQUENT TAXES OF 1920

Law Prohibiting Tax Sales From January 21 Applies Only to Present Year.

Many inquiries regarding the penalty and interest to be added to 1920 delinquent taxes are being received at the

office of the county treasurer, according to County Treasurer Fred C. Andretta. Because of the fact that a good number of taxpayers have a confused knowledge of this matter and are unfamiliar with the law passed during the recent session of the legislature, Mr. Andretta made the following statement:

The seventeenth regular session passed a law postponing the date of tax sale from January 20, 1921, to October 1, 1921. On 1920 delinquent taxes, 1 per cent interest will be added, starting with December 1, 1920, and also the cost of advertising, which is 50 cents for each description. The 10 per cent penalty will not be added until Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, October 1, the date of the tax sale.

"This law of postponement of tax sale for 1920 only applies for 1920, and will not be in force and effect in future years. A good many taxpayers

have been led to believe that this law has a permanent character, but such is not the case. The law was enacted primarily to aid the taxpayers after the crop failure of 1920. We are expecting a considerable rush before October 1 of those taxpayers who wish to avoid payment of the 10 per cent penalty."

Oregon-Montana Will Not Begin Pumping on Well Near Winnett

Lewistown, Sept. 4.—According to Contractor Stewart, who is putting down the well of the Oregon-Montana near Winnett and who put down the Williams well, there is as much oil in the Oregon-Montana now as there was in the Williams when the latter was put on pump. This course will not be followed by the Oregon-Montana for two reasons, first, the sand has not been reached, and second, the oil there has a gasoline content of only 20 per cent while the Williams well, in Cat Creek, has 52 per cent gasoline.
