Denies Boards Power. Cut Livestock Rates 20 Per Cent on S. Lay Down 16 Principles. A set of 16 principles was laid down for the guidance of the employer and employees in negotiating substitute rules for the national agreement, and it was one of these principles that the Pennsylvania struck a snag. The principle read: "The majority of any craft or class of employees shall have the right to determine what organization shall represent members of such craft or class. Such organization shall have the right to make an agreement which shall apply to all employees in such craft or class."

Two Mine Workers Are Still in Jail on Murder Charge Williamson, W. Va., Sept. 19.—C. F. Keeney and Fred Mooney, respectively president and secretary of District No. 17, United Mine Workers of America, were still in jail Monday night, after having been brought here from Charleston to answer indictments which charge the killing of two men in the industrial warfare along the Tug river last spring.

PHILANTHROPIST DIES. St. Paul, Sept. 19.—Victor Moreau Watkins, president of the Amherst H. Wilder Charities, died Monday night at his home here. He was 83 years old. Although an invalid for years, Mr. Watkins remained active head of the charities until last week.

Secretary Fall Sees Huntley Ditch Area Billings, Sept. 19.—Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall and Arthur Powell Davis, director of the United States reclamation service, today inspected the Huntley reclamation project and paid a visit to the Custer battle-field near Hardin. Methods of reducing the project maintenance cost were discussed with farmers at Ballantyne.
