ARBUCKLE BOYZE MAY BARE SMUGGLING

SIMS DENIES STATEMENT AS GLASS QUOTED

Admiral Avers Didn't Say U. S. Should Not Have Merchant Marine

Said "With Present Restrictions It Would Be Difficult Matter."

Washington, Sept. 19.—Declaring that Senator Carl Glass of Virginia was mistaken in quoting him as saying in a conversation in London that the United States ought not to undertake the development of a merchant marine of our own, Rear Admiral William S. Sims, in a letter to the National Merchant Marine association made public here, explained that what he did say was that "with the present restriction of our present shipping laws, it would be very difficult for our committee to develop a merchant marine commensurate with our needs."

The statement was in reply to a letter asking if the admiral had been correctly quoted by the Virginia senator in a recent speech in the senate.

What Glass Said.

In his senate speech Senator Glass was quoted as saying: "When I was abroad in 1918, Admiral Sims told me in London that he did not think that the United States ought to undertake the development of a merchant marine of its own. He thought that field of activity should be left to Great Britain and that the British were our kinsmen, one of our bone and blood of our blood, and might be relied on to come to our defense in case of war; that they were natural seamen and we knew nothing about it. Besides, he added, one request to make of all the far-seeing people of this city. I simply ask them to be fair to Mr. Arbuckle. I ask them to give him only that to which he is entitled in all fairness, and for which San Francisco is noted the world around—a square deal. I know, and his friends all know, that he is innocent. He is entitled to a trial by jury made up of men and women whose minds will be receptive alone to truth.

"Only one side of this story has been told and I know that the people of this city will wait until the other side come out in proper, orderly fashion in court. I believe everyone will agree with me that first impressions gained from rumor and report are most times found on closer investigation, to be false.

"I know that when the truth is heard in this matter—when the entire story has been unfolded—that my husband will be completely exonerated and his good name will be thoroughly cleared, and that he again will take his place in the hearts of the American people.

Far From His Views.

"I am not surprised that Senator Glass was much amazed if he understood me to say in London that the United States ought not to undertake the development of a merchant marine of its own," the admiral wrote in reply.

"Just how far this is from what I ever have or could have thought of the merchant marine, you may judge from the fact that the navy of the United States would be of very little value as a defense of the United States and our possessions if it were not for the merchant marine."

"Startling New Developments" Are Promised by Special Assistant to United States Attorney General, Who Decides Not to Ask Indictments on Liquor Charge Until at Some Later Date.

San Francisco, Sept. 19.—Federal indictments under the prohibition laws in connection with the party staged at the hotel St. Francis here by Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle will not be asked now, Robert H. McCormack, special assistant to the United States attorney general has announced. McCormack said he had decided upon delay because he expected "startling new developments."

McCormack is investigating the source of liquor alleged to have been consumed at the Arbuckle party. He expressed belief that his investigation will unearth a system of liquor smuggling from Mexico to Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Mrs. Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle (Minta Durfee) arrived in San Francisco early today from New York to assist in the defense of her actress-husband against a murder charge preferred against him for the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, film actress. Miss Rappe is declared to have died following injuries incurred at a party staged in Arbuckle's suite at the hotel St. Francis here early in September.

Arbuckle's attorney, Charles Brennan and Milton Cohen met Mrs. Arbuckle at Sacramento, denying her to all accessories. In lieu of being interviewed, the comedian's wife, who has been separated from her husband five years, gave out the following statement:

Wholesale Prices Increase in August, Foods Heading List

Washington, Sept. 19.—Wholesale prices increased 2.75 per cent in August over July levels, wholesale food prices leading in the advance with an increase of 13.5 per cent, according to figures made public by the department of labor.

Farm products, including many food articles, were 2.5 per cent higher in August than in July, the statement said adding that there were decided advances in butter, cheese, milk, eggs, rice, meats, sugars, fruits and potatoes.

Meat animals, including cattle and hogs, also averaged higher in August than in July. In all other commodity groups, except clothing, which was unchanged, the statement said, there were decreases in prices.

MINE WORKERS EXPECTED TO OPPOSE WAGE REDUCTION

New Trial Is Sought for Spokane Merchant Convicted of Murder

Spokane, Sept. 19.—Motion for a new trial in the case of Louis Adams, found guilty by a jury in superior court here Sunday of murder in the second degree for the alleged killing of Jose Guaracio, is expected to be filed soon by Adams' attorneys. They have announced an intention to ask a retrial of the case.

Adams and Guaracio, both fruit merchants, were neighbors, and a quarrel of long standing was declared to have culminated in the killing at a local commission house last August. Sentence will not be passed until the return to this city of Superior Judge Joseph H. Lindsley, before whom the case was tried and who has been called east by the death of his mother.

FEAR 70 LOSE LIVES IN AUSTRALIAN COLLIERY

Brisbane, Queensland, Sept. 19.—Seventy persons, it is feared, have lost their lives through a disaster in the Mount Mulligan colliery, near Cairns, North Queensland. The casualties were caused by an explosion of gas within the mine.

Prussian Radicals Break Up Celebration in Honor of Battle

Berlin, Sept. 19.—A celebration at Wilmersdorf of the battle of Tannenberg, following the anniversary of that engagement fought in East Prussia in 1914, was broken up Sunday by socialists and communists, who overpowered the nationalists and compelled their band to play revolutionary airs. The radicals also forced the band to accompany them to Bernau, where a bust of ex-emperor William and monarchical banners which they had captured were burned in the market place.

Injured Freighter Abandoned by Crew

New York, Sept. 19.—The freight steamer Malden, which was badly damaged Saturday in a collision off Montauk Point, with the freighter Jonancy, was abandoned Sunday in a rapidly sinking condition. Her crew was taken aboard the Jonancy.

Earlier in the day the Malden was taken in tow by the Jonancy, which escaped with slight damage.

20 Masked Bandits Overpower Guards, Steal Whisky Store

Bloomfield, Ky., Sept. 19.—Twenty masked, armed men overpowered two guards at the B. McCluskey & Sons distillery, bound and blindfolded them and escaped in seven touring cars with 88 cases and three barrels of whisky early Monday. The distillery is within a quarter of a mile of the center of Bloomfield's business section.

JAPANESE PARTY URGES ADHERENCE TO DEMANDS MADE

Orientalists Insist 21 Principles Sent to China Should Be Insisted Upon.

Tokio, Sept. 19.—(By The Associated Press).—Japan should adhere to the 21 demands she sent to China and should insist upon an agreement in all the other engagements of that country, says a resolution passed by the political committee of the Kensei-Kai, oriental party. M. Wakasuki, manager of the party and member of the Okuma cabinet which concluded the treaty embodying the 21 demands, in a statement delivered at that convention, declared that if Japan had territorial ambitions she could have seized part of China during the war instead of arranging a treaty designed to secure the economic development of China and Japan.

"An ultimatum to China is unauthorized," the statement declares, "because China has cancelled matters previously agreed to. Despite the denunciation of the treaty abroad, it was the means of preserving peace in the far east."

Japan in principle is ready for a complete examination of all affairs connected with China, according to information reaching The Associated Press. Responsible Japanese declare that all trade and other engagements or commitments are included, providing such engagements affect the interests of other powers in China. Japan is willing, it is said in the same quarter, for examination of the 21 demands agreement, provided its validity is not questioned and argument is not raised that the treaty was consummated by force.

It is understood Japan would insist, under the provisions of that treaty, on the right to renew leases in South Manchuria.

Warrant for Byram Charges Time Denied Employees to Vote

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Warrants for the arrest of H. E. Byram, president of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad and three other officials of the line were issued Monday by County Judge Reighmeyer charging them with refusing to give employees their statutory hours off on election day to permit them to vote.


