# NET IS SPREAD FOR UNLICENSED BROKERS HERE

State Officials Arrive From Helena to Round Up Dealers in Realty and Oil Leases.

To round up Great Falls real estate men and dealers in oil leases who have failed to take out a license as provided by the last legislature, State Auditor George P. Porter, who is real estate commissioner by virtue of his office, and Deputy Commissioner W. S. Hosking arrived in Great Falls from Helena Monday night. So far 32 real estate brokers in Great Falls have taken out state licenses, which is about half the number who are asserted by Deputy Hosking to be engaged in real estate or oil

lease brokerage here, and is less than half the number estimated by the Great Falls Realty Board.

Under the new law every person engaging in the real estate business must file with the real estate commissioner a formal application from a licensee and must furnish a reference signed by five freeholding residents of the county certifying they are personally acquainted with the applicant and believe him to be a person of integrity, of good moral character, of the age of 21 years, a citizen of the United States and a resident of the county and state, and believe him to be fully qualified and competent to transact business of a real estate broker, and therefore respectfully recommend him for a license to transact such business.

The applicant must furnish a bond in the sum of \$1,000 and pay a fee of \$10 which will permit him to engage in business until the first of April of the following year.

To Visit Other Cities. Mr. Hosking recently made a trip to Butte where he rounded up a number of delinquents and expects later to go to Billings, Lewistown and other cities. So far it has not been deemed necessary to institute any proceedings in the courts against delinquents. The

law provides as a penalty for engaging in the business without such a license a fine of not to exceed \$500.

### Interest on County Funds Is Imperative

Helena, Sept. 19.—County treasurers of Montana are prevented by law from depositing funds in banks without receiving the legal rate of 2 1/2 per cent interest, according to an opinion handed down Monday by Attorney General Wellington D. Rankin. The opinion also states that treasurers must deposit in designated banks all the funds in their possession, except funds for current business. The opinion was requested by H. F. Miller, county attorney at Fort Benton.
