

CASCADE AUTOS LED BY LEWIS AND CLARK IN AVERAGE VALUE

Silver Bow First in Numbers According to Assessment Records of State.

Special to The Tribune. Helena, Sept. 21.—While Cascade county returned a much greater number of automobiles for assessment this year than did Lewis & Clark county...

McCona county, with an average of \$194.08, was the lowest in the state with thirty county cars averaging \$209.83.

The average value for the 46,943 automobiles assessed in the state this year is \$404.74. Last year \$1,575 were assessed at an average of \$408.49.

Reports by counties, with the exception of Fergus, Glacier, Lincoln, Phillips and Teton, which reported only the total assessments, follow: Cascade, 937 cars at \$346,177; Big Horn, 639 at \$416,122; Blaine, 681 at \$273,155; Broadwater, 388 at \$336,600; Carbon, 1,027 at \$344,737; Carter, 385 at \$258,891; Cascade, 3,273 at \$894,000; Chouteau, 1,240 at \$235,655; Custer, 830 at \$372,639; Daniels, 413 at \$329,733; Dawson, 833 at \$263,235; Deer Lodge, 846 at \$478,370.

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Governor Orders Sweeping Investigation of Insane Hospitals in Washington

Reports Reaching Executive of Abuses and Mistreatment at State Institution Causes Him to Appoint Committee to Learn Facts.

Olympia, Wash., Sept. 21.—To determine the authenticity of published statements regarding conditions in the insane hospitals at Sedro Wooley and Steilacoom, Governor Louis F. Hart Wednesday appointed nine representative men and women to investigate congestions in the institutions and report back with "criticisms of any abuses, or lack of care or attention that such conditions may be corrected."

The committee named by the governor is composed of the following members: George E. Gage, Bellingham; Robert Hesketh, Seattle; Mrs. John P. Weyerhaeuser, Tacoma; Rev. W. A. Mori, Seattle; Harry McCormack, Tacoma; Mrs. A. E. Larson, Yakima; Right Rev. E. J. O'Dea, Seattle; Mrs. John H. Powell, Seattle and E. D. Colvin, Seattle.

There have been many rumors and unsupported stories circulating throughout the state concerning conditions at the Northern hospital for the insane at Sedro Wooley and the Western Washington hospital at Steilacoom. I am unable to get verification of these stories and in the very nature of things it would be impossible for me to verify them by personal investigation.

Conditions are reported to be such as to demand early and forcible action and I ought to know, and the public are entitled to know whether or not these rumors are true. If the stories are based on fact the governor should know in order that prompt action might be taken to correct the abuses. If they are not true, that fact ought to be published from a committee of unquestioned integrity and veracity that the public mind might be put at rest.

Unexpected Visit. "It is my desire that this committee arrange at the earliest possible date for a visit to the Northern hospital, without notice to the superintendent or anyone else in authority as to the date of their visit, and make a thorough investigation of conditions at the institution, and of the care, attention and food given to the wards. This letter will authorize the committee, or any part of it herein named, to admittance to any part of the grounds or buildings and to converse publicly or privately by interrogation or otherwise with any of the state's wards, as well as any of the employees, including the superintendent."

When the investigation is completed I want a frank report of conditions at the institution, together with a criticism of any abuses, irregularities or lack of care or attention, that the same may be promptly corrected. After which I would like a similar investigation at the Western Washington hospital.

The date of the first meeting of the committee for organization purposes was not definitely fixed but will probably be held in Seattle within the next few days.

Former Premier Has Proclaimed West Hungary a Republic Declare Vienna Papers. Vienna, Sept. 21.—Stephen Frederick, former Hungarian premier arrived at Oedenburg Burgenland on Monday, and proclaimed West Hungary a republic, it is declared by newspapers here. Burgenland was recently in the hands of insurgent Hungarian bands, but they were believed to have withdrawn, for the most part, as a result of representations by allied forces.

Assertion is made here, however, that these bands have been constantly reinforced until their numbers are now nearly 30,000 in number and it is said these men are so well armed and equipped that it is doubtful if Hungarian regular soldiers sent out to oust them, would be able to cope with them.

The Carlists and the Legitimists have joined issues over the Burgenland question. Oil Workers May Tie Up All Fields in California, Claim. Coalinga, Calif., Sept. 21.—The "insistent refusal" of certain oil operators in California to make the government a party to the proposed agreement in the oil fields and refineries "threatens to compel us to tie up every oil field, refinery and pipe line," Walter Yarrow, counsel for the oil and refinery workers union, said here Wednesday.

"Following this act, the government will unquestionably take some drastic action the way or the other to settle the question," Yarrow said. The executive committee of the union has called a meeting in Bakersfield on Friday to discuss the general tie up, Yarrow said.

TABOO SILK STOCKINGS. San Francisco, Sept. 21.—Girl students of the high school of commerce, about one thousand in number, voted nine to one Wednesday in favor of abolishing the wearing of silk stockings, transparent waists, fancy frocks and pyramid handbags, and to substitute cotton stockings, middle blouses and gingham dresses.

Standing on Head 3000 Feet Above Big Abyss His Delight

Special to The Tribune. Butte, Sept. 21.—Larry Keegan, former Butte boy, who started the national park authorities a short time ago, by his daring stunts on overhanging rocks, for which he was arrested, is in the city for a few days, visiting friends.

Keegan is said to be the only person who ever performed stunts on an overhanging rock, which extends out more than 10 feet from a cliff in the park, with a drop of approximately 3,000 feet to the bottom. Keegan stood on his head on the edge of the rock, dangled his feet in the air and did various other stunts, while commercial photographers took pictures of his feats.

The park authorities, who also ordered discontinuance of the sale of postal cards, from which Keegan was to receive a royalty. Keegan was in the late war and was wounded in the hip by a shell while fighting in the Argonne. He has a powerful grip in his hands and does not know what nerves are when it comes to climbing. He has received several offers to go into the moving picture business.

MINERAL RIGHT TAX PUT FORTH TO FREE SOLD LAND ENTIRELY State Board of Equalization Wrangles Over Clutch Tying Up Resources.

The board indulged in considerable of a wrangle over the matter. In the matter of the Musselshell county assessments, the county had fixed the value of this right at \$10 per acre. Mr. Rankin moved that the assessments of all reservations be fixed at \$5 per acre, while Mr. Stewart moved as a substitute that they be fixed at the same figure as in 1920, which was \$3 per acre in Musselshell county, \$1 in Custer county, and 50 cents in other counties.

Governor Dixon opposed the Rankin motion on the grounds that, whereas, last year the classification for mineral reservations provided for a basis of but 30 per cent of the assessment, the law enacted by the last legislature raised this to 100 per cent. He explained that, in the case of the \$1 per acre assessment, the increase to \$5 an acre would mean an increase of virtually 17 times that of last year.

The governor held that these land companies should not be permitted to retain such rights in lands they had sold.

Mr. Porter, who seconded the Rankin motion, said that if the board increases the assessment to \$5 per acre these companies will either have to give up these rights or else take the state into court.

The governor and the attorney general engaged for some time in an argument over the matter and concerning the supreme court decision rendered by former Associate Justice Sanner, and it was finally decided to postpone action until next Friday.

A number of other matters of lesser importance were considered and acted upon by the board during the afternoon, involving property in Butte, Missoula and other points in the state.

GOES BACK TO SOAP FACTORY AFTER SPENDING SUMMER AT BRYN MAWR COLLEGE

Kansas City, Kan., Sept. 21.—After putting in two months at Bryn Mawr College this summer, Miss Louise Beauchamp of this city is back at the soap factory where she is a forewoman.

The previous education this Kansas girl had enjoyed halted abruptly at the eighth grade. She then went to work in the factory wrapping cakes of soap. She continued at it several years, until she was chosen to go to Bryn Mawr with all the expenses paid. This was part of an experiment, conducted by the college authorities, women labor leaders and alumnae this year for the first time. Eighty-one factory workers in various parts of the country were given scholarships, and had every advantage of college life and education at this well known Pennsylvania institution. Then they went back to the work they had left.

Miss Beauchamp came back fired with ambition to do something to lend a helping hand to her fellow workers and better their conditions in every way possible, she says. "How would you set about to do it, if you had a free hand?" inquired a visitor. "I'd unionize them," she replied promptly, and work for better hours and "better pay."

Miss Beauchamp says she does not expect to return to Bryn Mawr or any other college for further work. She says that, as far as her plans are now, she will go ahead with the old job, trying to shed with the summer's experience, and trying to help other girls make their own jobs better.

MORALITY CLAUSE WILL BE PUT IN ACTORS' CONTRACTS Film Producing Company States They Are Making Change to Protect Their Interests.

New York, Sept. 21.—"A morality clause," pledging actors and actresses to "conduct their lives in a manner to public conventions" on penalty of forfeiting their positions with five days' notice, will be immediately inserted in all contracts of a large film producing corporation, it was announced by its counsel. The action was taken, a statement by the attorneys said, as a direct result of the Arbuckle case in San Francisco, although it was emphasized that the clause was not intended to prevent actors from appearing in burlesque or other places.
