50 CENT BLEACHERS FOR WORLD SERIES, IS JOHNSON'S PLEA

Head of American League Favors Return to "Normalcy" in Baseball Admissions.

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Ban Johnson Wednesday night declared himself in favor of a return to normalcy in world series baseball prices, and said he favored restoring the 50 cent bleacher seat. Mr. Johnson, John A. Heydler, president of the National league and Judge Landis, baseball commissioner, will meet Thursday to arrange preliminary details for the 1921 series. Should the reduced prices be proposed, Mr. Johnson said he would vote for it. He said he thought the return to normalcy should be heralded with a 50-cent \$5.00 minimum and maximum for the series. Prior to 1918 bleacher seats cost 50 cents. In that year the admissions were doubled and the top price was set at \$5.00. Last year top prices were \$6.00. A tentative schedule for the series will be drawn up here. Pittsburgh in the National league, Cleveland in the American league and the New York clubs will be considered. With the major league season ending Oct. 2, Mr. Johnson said he thought the world series might be gotten under way October 4, and if the two New York teams are the champions, the series might be inaugurated a day earlier.

Howard Wilcox Wins 50 Mile Automobile Race in Indiana

Indianapolis, Sept. 21.—Howard Wilcox, of Indianapolis, won a 50-mile exhibition race staged today at the Indianapolis motor speedway for the entertainment of delegates to the third annual convention of the American Society for Steel Treating. Wilcox's time was 30:50:08, an average speed of 97.5 miles an hour. Rain delayed the start of the race and the distance was cut from one hundred miles. Five other starters finished in the order named: Jimmy Murphy, Jules Ellingboe, Joe Thomas, Eddie Hearne and Charles Van Rantz.

ECONOMY DEMANDS \$26,000 CUT IN FISH AND GAME STOCKING

State Commission Must Find Way to Reduce; License Income About Same. Helena, Sept. 21.—Efforts to trim more than \$25,000 from the year's expenditures of the state fish and game commission will be made at a meeting of the commission in Malco, October 10, according to an announcement. Up to the present time there have only been approximately \$5,000 residential licenses sold for 1921, according to Warden C. A. Jakways. Last year there were 52,751 sold. Although the license fee was raised this year, and virtually the same amount of cash will be taken in this year as last, it was said that the expenditures of the commission have increased to such an extent that a retrenchment is necessary.

BOZEMAN ELEVEN OR MISSOULA MAY PLAY GREAT FALLS

Heavier Games Sought by Coach Crouch for This Season's Football Schedule.

Coach M. L. Crouch of the high school is trying to get football games with either Bozeman or Missoula high schools so as to fill out the schedule with heavier teams and schools which are working closer to the championship state. It has been some years since either school has sent an eleven to Great Falls. Already practice games have been signed with Choteau (Teton county) and Fort Benton to be played in Great Falls. The first contest of the season will be October 1 with Choteau and Fort Benton will come here a week later. A game with Butte is almost sure but it has not been decided when or where it will be waged. Great Falls will probably go to Billings, but a Helena game is in doubt. Coach Crouch has three squads on the field daily and excellent material is showing up. Probabilities are that Great Falls will have a championship team this year because nearly all of the last year team have returned. However, the big and speedy men are scheduled to graduate next June and it will leave the Electric City team rather weak. The campaign for high school athletic association members will be carried on the later part of this week. It is expected a good majority of the student body will "enlist" this year as before. With more than 1100 in the school it is thought probable that 900 will subscribe.
