

# JAPAN DEMANDS PACIFIC PEACE BE LEFT TO HER

Delegates Instructed Not to Scrap '21 Demands' Agreement in China.

Chinese Delegation Is Leaving for Parley at American Capital.

Tokio, Sept. 29.—As a part of her fundamental policy at the Washington conference, Japan will not permit the "scrapping" of its "twenty-one demands" agreement with China and will not tolerate intervention in Shantung question it was declared to the Associated Press Wednesday by a Japanese in an unauthorized position. He asserted Japan considered these matters as accomplished facts which concerned China and Japan directly. In the general discussion of Far Eastern matters however, Japan was said to be willing frankly to explain her position regarding this question.

**Issue Instructions.** The government is preparing to issue special instructions to the Japanese delegates concerning the limitation of armaments, says the Nichi Nichi Shimbun. It is indicated that the project for the building of eight battleships and eight cruisers originated in the idea that this program was necessary for the national defense but that Japan has come to recognize the project has lost its original significance. She is, therefore, prepared, in agreement with the powers, to carry out such curtailment, it is said, as would make her navy strong enough to maintain the peace of the Far East.

The choice of Prince Tokugawa, as head of the Japanese delegation meets with national favor, and gives the Ken-sei-Kai, or opposition party no ground for attack upon the government.

Opposition newspapers, however, turn a fire of criticism upon Premier Hara, saying he was "too cowardly to go to Washington himself and accept responsibility for discussions taken there."

**CHINESE MISSION LEAVES FOR PARLEY** Peking, Sept. 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—China's delegation to the conference on limitation of armaments and Far Eastern questions left this city for Shanghai Thursday on its way to Washington intending to make the voyage across the Pacific on the steamer Hawkeye State. Dr. W. W. Yen, foreign minister who has been expected to be chief of the delegation did not leave Thursday, but it was said he would follow, provided China's Shantung policy was determined soon enough for him to reach the American capital for the opening of the conference.

Four prominent diplomats who left were Chow Tzechi, formerly secretary of the Chinese legation in Washington, Wang Ta-shieh, leader of the progressive party and former minister of foreign affairs, and Dr. M. T. Liang, former minister of foreign affairs.

The remainder of the party consisted of 22 technical experts, 19 secretaries assigned to various departments, 19 attaches, 17 translators and several foreign advisers.

**PILCHER NEW CHIEF** Indianapolis, Sept. 29.—Lewis S. Pilcher of Brooklyn, N. Y., was elected commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic at the fifty-fifth annual encampment today. He succeeds William A. Ketcham of Indianapolis.



# Famous Newberry Case Now Goes to Senate for Action; Ford Is Flayed

Decision Not to Be Returned for Few Weeks; Michigan Member Will Not Attend Sessions Until Final Hearing; Ford Charges of Bribery Are Dismissed.

Washington, Sept. 29.—Opinions conflicting along party lines were presented Thursday by majority and minority members of the senate privileges and elections committee on the Ford-Newberry 1918 senatorial election contest from Michigan.

The majority report cleared Senator Truman H. Newberry the Republican candidate of corruption and all other charges, and recommended that he be legally seated. The Democratic members on the contrary, asserted that Senator Newberry was elected by "corrupt and illegal methods and practices," and recommended that his seat be declared vacant.

With filing of reports the case now goes to the senate for final decision which will probably not be made for several weeks. In the meantime, it is understood Senator Newberry will not attend the senate sessions.

On only two major issues were the Republicans and Democrats in harmony in the reports filed Thursday. They agreed that Henry Ford, the Democratic contestant, had not been elected and was not entitled to the seat from Michigan. They also agreed that too much money had been spent in the Michigan primary. The Democrats, however, contended that Senator Newberry was responsible personally for the expenditures while the Republicans held he was not.

**The Majority Report.** Recommendations of the majority report, submitted by Senator Spencer, Republican, who conducted the committee investigation and recount, were: "1.—That the contest of Henry Ford against Truman H. Newberry be, and it is hereby, dismissed.

"2.—That Truman H. Newberry is hereby declared to be a duly elected senator from the state of Michigan for the term of six years, commencing on the 4th day of March, 1919.

"3.—That his qualification for a seat in the senate of the United States to which he has been elected has been conclusively established, and the charges made against him in this proceeding both as to his election and qualifications, are not sustained."

Conclusions of the minority presented by Senator Pomerene, Democrat, Ohio, and signed also by Senators King, Utah, and Ashurst, Arizona, were:

**The Minority Report.** "First.—That the irregularities complained of do not relate to the general election but to the primary. Henry Ford did not receive a plurality of the votes cast at the general election. We therefore find that the petitioner, Henry Ford, was not elected, and is not entitled to a seat in the senate of the United States.

"Second.—We find that under the facts and circumstances of this case, corrupt and illegal methods and practices were employed at the primary election and that Truman H. Newberry violated the corrupt practices act and the primary act of the state of Michigan and that by reason thereof, he ought not to have or hold a seat in the senate of the United States and that he is not the duly elected senator from the state of Michigan for the term of six years commencing on the fourth day of March, 1919, and we recommend therefore that his seat be declared vacant.

A separate minority report also was submitted by Senator Ashurst, who declared Senator Newberry's credentials were "stained by fraud and tainted by illegal expenditure of money. The testimony showed, he said, that the 1918 Michigan campaign 'partook more of the character of an auction than of an election."

Both majority and minority members agreed that it was established conclusively that in the general election Senator Newberry had received a majority of the votes. Mr. Ford's charges of bribery, illegal voting, undue influence and intimidation of voters in the general election were declared by the majority to be without foundation.

**Great Money Expenditures.** Money expenditures in the primary was the point at issue in the conflicting recommendations. This was placed by the majority at approximately \$195,000 and at least \$188,998 by the minority. There was virtually total disagreement along partisan lines as to Senator Newberry's responsibility for and management of the expenditures.

"There is no evidence whatever to sustain the statement of improper use of money at the primary or the general election," the majority declared.

The evidence shows conclusively that the financial cost of the campaign was voluntarily borne by relatives and friends of Truman H. Newberry and was entirely without solicitation or knowledge upon his part.

"The amount of money spent at the primary was large—too large—but there was no concealment with regard to it and it was spent entirely for legal and proper purposes."

The Democratic report declared that "the exorbitant expenditures in this primary campaign exceeded the limitations of the constitution," and were enough to pay Senator Newberry's senate salary for 25 years.

"This money was expended through the agency of the Newberry senatorial committee," the report continued.

"The Michigan law limited the expenditure of any candidate for the senate to \$3,750. We submit this amount could not be increased by the organization of a committee to act as his agent and the committee did so act.

"The Newberry senatorial committee violated the Michigan law by far exceeding the limitations of expenditures \* \* \* by directing purchases and its members to purchase drinks and cigars for voters.

Proper accounts of expenditures were not filed, either by the Newberry committee or the candidate, the minority asserted, and although the supreme court held the state law unconstitutional, the Democrats declared "The moral turpitude" was as great as "if the law had been upheld.

"In our opinion," the Democrats stated, "the record conclusively establishes a conspiracy."

**REWARD OFFERED FOR CAPTURE OF BANDITS** Oklahoma City, Sept. 29.—A telegram was received by post office officials here from Postmaster General Hays authorizing a reward of \$30,000 for the capture of the bandits who held up train No. 5 of the Atchison Topeka and Santa Fe railroad near here Wednesday night and robbed a mail car. The reward is in the form of \$5,000 for each of the six men who participated in the robbery.

The Santa Fe was the first railroad in America to adopt a system of watch inspection.



# BREAD LINE OPENS FOR AID OF JOBLESS IN NEW YORK CITY

Men Race From Park Benches to Be First in Line; Say Conditions Not So Bad.

New York, Sept. 29.—New York's first bread line since the beginning of the world war is in operation Thursday at the Church of St. Marks, in the Bowery.

The bread line was opened under direction of Dr. William N. Guthrie, rector, as a result of conferences last week with Urabin Ledoux, champion of the unemployed.

About 600 men, many of whom raced from the benches in Bryant park to be first in line, were fed. Dormitories have been opened in the Chapel and about 150 men slept there Wednesday.

Despite the opening of the bread line and the chapel sleeping quarters, members of the Industrial Aid bureau reiterated that unemployment conditions here had become overpacked. It was pointed out that the municipal lodging house and other agencies where jobless men can get food and shelter, in exchange for two hours' work, were running far below capacity.

**ALIEN MEMBERS CREW OF STEAMER FIRED** New York, Sept. 29.—Two hundred alien members of the crew of the George Washington, the largest passenger liner operating under the American flag, were discharged Thursday in furtherance of the policy of the United States shipping board to have only American crews on American ships which it owns.

Similar action will be taken with regard to other shipping board vessels operated by the line, officials said.

**HOLD WORLD CONFERENCE.** Dublin, Sept. 29.—(By The Associated Press.)—A world conference of the Irish race will be held in Paris on January 22, 1922, the anniversary of the first session of the Dail Eireann, it was announced by the Sinn Fein organization here Thursday.

Fourteen countries will be represented at the conference, it was said. A secretariat already has been opened in Paris.

**FUND TO BE CONTINUED FOR AMERICANIZATION WORK** Word has been received by Ralph Wolf, general secretary of Y. M. C. A., that arrangements have been made to arrange transfers and continue the Great Falls Americanization funds. The appropriation will be \$250 per month, according to word received by Secretary Wolf from A. B. Miner, industrial secretary of the Rocky Mountain region of the Y. M. C. A.

The step was taken in hope of finding a clue to the slayer of Fred Christensen, cashier of the Glenview state bank, who was shot and killed in the bank last Saturday. The slayer left several clearly defined finger prints as the only clue.

About 250 men live in the village.

**INDICTMENT ISSUED AGAINST ALLEGED MATERIALS TRUST** New York, Sept. 29.—The federal grand jury, which has been investigating an alleged materials trust, Wednesday handed down an indictment charging two groups of Terra Cotta manufacturing corporations—the Atlantic Eastern and the American National—and their officers with violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

Corporations indicted in the National group included terra cotta manufacturing concerns in Illinois, Indiana, California, Missouri, Washington, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Georgia.

The indictment follows two others handed down recently by the grand jury against the sand and gravel dealers, and the Portland cement manufacturers and dealers.
