BOTH ARE CRUEL, IS COURT'S RULE

Carlile Divorce Matter Dismissed; Judge Leslie Sustains Jury.

District Judge J. B. Leslie Thursday dismissed the Carlile divorce which has been pending in the courts for several months. Judge Leslie, in his order of dismissal, sustained the findings of the jury which heard the case last March in which James Carlile, well known Cascade county rancher, and Theresa Carlile, his wife, were both adjudged guilty of extreme cruelty.

Mrs. Carlile was the plaintiff in the suit, alleging that her husband had beaten and assaulted her on numerous occasions, primarily because she had accused him of harboring horse thieves and other criminals on his ranch south of Great Falls. Carlile replied with a cross-complaint, also alleging extreme cruelty and asking that a decree of divorce be awarded him.

When the case came before the court, the jury returned two special findings wherein both plaintiff and defendant were found guilty of cruelty. Carlile, by his counsel, asked the court to adopt the finding filed against his wife, but the motion was overruled by Judge Leslie in yesterday's order. Numerous orders were handed down by the court in this case. Mrs. Carlile was allowed temporary alimony during the pendency of the action.
