THIRTY TONS OF LARD ARE SOLD BY GREAT FALLS MEAT COMPANY TO CITY STORES IN LAST 3 DAYS

Thirty tons of lard manufactured at the plant of the Great Falls Meat Co. were sold during the last three days of September to Great Falls retail concerns for the city trade. The sales were made in a special selling campaign put on by the plant and lard was distributed principally in comparatively small lots, although in several instances a number of tons were taken by different stores and meat shops. Delivery of the lard was completed by the plant Saturday.

Butchering of hogs has been suspended at the packing plant since September 15, but will be resumed before November 1. This department of the plant is usually closed during this period each year to permit completion of arrangements for the year's operations.

But a very small proportion of hogs killed at the plant this fall, and throughout the year, has been furnished by Montana growers, it was stated by Frank B. Brown of the company. Small lots of butcherable hogs are received the plant, but the great bulk of the live hogs slaughtered are imported from South Dakota.

Mr. Brown stated that breeding of hogs will undoubtedly be resumed in Montana on a larger scale another year, but that the plant will depend to a great extent on Dakota grown porkers during the winter, spring and early summer. A considerable amount of breeding stock has been distributed to Montana farmers during the last year by the Great Falls Meat Co.

Corcoran Will Leave Monday for Portland J. H. Corcoran, practicing attorney in Great Falls during the last 12 years, will leave Monday for Portland, Ore., where he will permanently engage in the law and general investment business. Arrangements for transfer of his location to the coast city were made on a trip there two weeks ago.

Mr. Corcoran will be a visitor in Great Falls frequently after his removal to the coast, due to his extensive interests here and in Canada. He is the owner of considerable real estate in the city and 22,000 acres of farm land in Montana and Alberta.

The oil business, Mr. Corcoran states, is demanding wide attention in Oregon now and several Montana companies have been almost wholly financed in Portland. An oil boom recently got under way at Astoria and a well financed company is preparing to drill test wells near the city.

ADDITIONAL SPORTING NEWS Great Falls High Wins Over Choteau, 122 to 0

Teton County Boys Unable at Any Stage of Game to Cope With Stronger Opponents. The Great Falls high school football team walked away with its first game of the season Saturday afternoon against the Choteau high school, leaving the latter the small end of a 122 to 0 score.

Great Falls permitted the Teton county boys to make only four first downs throughout the contest. Coach M. L. Crouch of Great Falls used 24 men. Eighteen touchdowns and 14 goals tell the tale.

Choteau played a hard game and fought through to the finish, although it was helpless before the Blue and White. Teton's only two chances to score were thrown away, once in the third and once in the fourth quarters. Gosner, Winner, Bros, Morris and Shaw starred for Great Falls, while McNeil and Anderson played best for Choteau.

As soon as the Great Falls boys got the oval, they would dash through the center of the Teton line or race around the ends for touchbacks. When playing on the defensive, the Blue and White line formed a veritable stone wall which was impregnable to the visitors. Both teams worked aerial attacks to good advantage many times.

A brilliant tackle by Billie Hodge in the last period kept Choteau from a score. After several boys had failed to catch F. Wiprud, Choteau left end, on a 25-yard run, Hodge covered the width of the field in time to make a flying tackle.

Morris, Peterson, Bros, Winner, Gosner, time after time tore through the Red and Gold line or around the ends for 15 or 20 yards. Only three or four times did Choteau hold the Blue and White.

The Great Falls boys excelled the Choteau players in most departments, but at times they did not hit the opposing line as hard as was possible. McNeil, Choteau, was taken from the field because of injuries.

Hardship was worked on both teams by cheering while signals were being run off and by spectators bunching and pressing forward on the west side line, where the automobiles were parked.
