

HUNTER KILLED BY ACCIDENTAL SHOTGUN WOUND

Floyd Lewis, Ranch Hand Near Cascade, Succumbs 24 Hours After Accident.

Returning from duck hunting Friday evening Floyd Lewis, 28, a farm hand on the Goetz ranch near Cascade, received injuries when his shotgun was accidentally discharged which proved fatal, resulting in his death at the Columbus hospital at 5 p. m. Saturday.

According to Nona McCartney, daughter of the family running the ranch at which Lewis worked, he was returning from hunting shortly after 6 p. m. Friday. He crossed a creek to reach the ranch house and riding in a light roadster the rocky bottom of the creek caused the displacement of his shotgun and it slipped through the ranch door and the trigger caught on the running board.

Lewis had worked on the ranch about two and one-half years, according to Mrs. McCartney. He is survived by his father and mother from two brothers and a sister, all of whom reside at Custer, Wn. The body was taken to the W. H. George Co. chapel, but no arrangements have been made for burial.

Overpowers Victim in Rooming House to Steal \$220, Charged

Charged with robbing Joseph Strook of \$220, alleged to have been accomplished by overpowering the victim in a south side rooming house Friday night, J. D. Troson, a rancher near Manchester, was locked up in the county jail Saturday night.

Troson was arrested in Portage by Deputy Sheriff Guy Palagi and Jack Abrams, after Troson had walked practically all of the way from Great Falls. The officers kept in touch with Troson by frequent communication with people living near the Portage road.

A complaint charging the man with robbery was filed Saturday afternoon in the Wilson justice court. Troson will be held without bail for examination early this week.

Hotel in Highwood Sold to New Owner

The Highwood hotel, principal hostelry in the Chouteau county city that to date has marketed more wheat than any other Montana point, was sold last week by Mrs. Fred Raymond to Margaret Kenninburg, late of Wagner, Mont. It was announced in Great Falls Saturday by John L. Watson of the Watson Land Co. The deal transfers to Mrs. Kenninburg the business of the hotel and the lease on the building.

Through a deal concluded in Great Falls Friday the Hotel Acme, 317-2 Central avenue, was sold by L. E. Brown to J. E. Laureman of Lewistown, the purchaser taking over the business and furnishings and the lease on the building.
