

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NEED FOR NEW SCHOOL BUILDING IS DISCUSSED BY EDUCATION BOARD AND SUPERINTENDENT S. D. LARGENT

"The crowded condition of the schools of Great Falls, especially the high school, was brought before the trustees of the board of trustees of district No. 1 at their regular meeting Monday night at the Washington school by S. D. Largent, city superintendent of schools and resulted in a discussion by the members of the board of the feasibility of erecting another school. No action was taken on the matter, but it was suggested that if there is any hope of building a school and having it ready for occupancy by September, that decision should be made shortly and bonds authorized. Superintendent Largent pointed out to the members of the board of trustees that the enrollment in the schools of Great Falls this year is 5,078 pupils, an increase of 226 more than the enrollment last year. Of this number of additional pupils 172 are registered at the high school and the majority of the remainder are registered in the grade schools. The high school shows a loss of five pupils in comparison to the registration last year, he stated, and 50 less at the Franklin school on the west side. These are the only two schools with a smaller registration than they had in 1920, the superintendent stated.

Approximately 2000 veterans of the world war and widows and orphans are assured the utilization of a couple of rooms in the Washington school for class purposes.

"There is a big educational problem facing us at present," said Superintendent Largent, but it is the same which is facing other cities. Universities throughout the country are pressed for space and the time is coming when the junior college proposition will be put to use and students will receive two years of college work in the high school."

"Great Falls will need more schools in the future," he continued, "and it is our duty to select suitable locations for this purpose so that when the time comes we will have them at locations properly centralized. There is no question but that we need more room and when we build we must build for the future with the aim of establishing an educational monument."

The members of the board discussed the matter for a time before adjournment. The general consensus was that the school should be centrally located. The need of an administrative building for school officials was pointed out to the members of the board. This would permit the utilization of a couple of rooms in the Washington school for class purposes.
