SLIGHT DECREASE IS SHOWN IN UNEMPLOYMENT DURING SEPTEMBER SAYS U.S. REPORT

Washington, Oct. 6.—A slight decrease in unemployment throughout the United States was reported for September by the department of labor in a summary of conditions made public Thursday. On September 30, the department said, 1,428 establishments had 18,050 more workers on their payrolls than on August 31, an increase of 1.2 per cent. In 63 principal cities, employment decreased in 26 but increased in 38, and in one—Columbus, Ohio—remained unchanged during the month.

THREATENED SPLIT IN RANKS OF BANKERS AVERTED; OBJECT TO NATIONAL BANK BRANCHES

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—A threatened split in the ranks of the American Bankers association was averted Thursday by the announcement that the executive council of the organization had reversed an earlier decision favoring establishment of branches by national banks, under certain conditions. The announcement was made by John S. Drum, president, in Thursday's general session of the association's convention.

Marquette, Mich., Oct. 6.—The itinerary of Marshal Ferdinand Foch, of France, from the date of his arrival in New York, October 28, on his way to attend the American Legion National convention in Kansas City, until November 11, Armistice day, when he takes part in the services at the grave of the "unknown American soldier" in Arlington cemetery, was announced here Thursday by Alton T. Roberts, chairman of the Legion committee in charge of arrangements for Foch's reception.

Pearce Appointed to Conference as Australia Delegate

Melbourne, Australia, Oct. 6.—(By The Associated Press.)—Premier Hughes Thursday announced in the house of representatives that the federal government had appointed George Pearce, minister of defense, to represent Australia at the forthcoming conference on limitation of armaments and far eastern questions in Washington.

Doctor Is Questioned at Southard Trial

Twin Falls, Ida., Oct. 6.—Edward F. Meyer was suffering from some sort of intestinal ailment or some sort of poison in his opinion when he saw him on September 3 at the county hospital, Dr. D. L. Alexander Thursday told the jury during his examination by County Prosecutor Stephens. He saw nothing about the patient to indicate typhoid fever.

Three Bandits Steal Five Sacks of Mail in Chicago Station

Chicago, Oct. 6.—Three bandits Thursday stole five sacks of mail from an Illinois Central loading platform, but were captured by the police and the loot returned before post-office officials were aware that it had been stolen. Two of the sacks contained registered mail.

London Has Own Troubles on Taxes

London, Oct. 6.—Resolutions opposing the levy of any local taxes except those to meet local needs and the requirements of the poor law until the London tax rates are equalized were adopted by the council of the Borough of Stepney Wednesday night. These resolutions were identical with those recently adopted by the borough councils of Poplar and other suburbs. The borough councillors of Poplar were placed in jail recently for contempt of court, following their refusal to comply with an order asking the council to raise tax rates.

Canada and Montana Will Split Water Equally During Nonirrigation Season; During Summer Months Minute Rules Will Govern Distribution Based on Gauging Stations' Reports.

Ottawa, Can., Oct. 6.—The agreement reached by the members of the joint international commission for the division of the waters of the St. Mary and the Milk rivers between the United States and Canada, calls for a reservoir at the outlet of St. Mary lake near Glacier park, and the impounding of the flood waters of the region, to be divided between Canada and Montana. The cost of the proposed reservoir is to be borne jointly by the Canadian and the United States governments and not chargeable against the reclamation projects in Canada and in Montana. The settlement, it is understood, is subject to the approval of the two governments.

DISCUSSED BY DIXON

It was later discussed by the governor publicly before the commission at the Chinook hearing, and later by the governor and the commissioners in the presence of Canadian and American engineers on board the special train on which the commission traveled on the Great Northern railroad. It was at that time considered feasible and practical, but the members of the commission hesitated to accept it as a solution before first consulting their respective governments, because of the possible expense of the construction of a reservoir.

Division at Boundary

The recommendations submitted by the commissioners to their respective governments apply only to waters that cross the international boundary and the division is at the boundary. The rules for the measurement and apportionment of the waters to be used by the two countries are many and minute. During the irrigation season when the normal flow of the Milk river at the eastern boundary crossing is 600 cubic feet per second or less, the United States gets three-fourths and Canada one-fourth of the flow. When it exceeds this volume, the United States gets prior appropriation of 500 cubic feet a second, and the excess of 100 feet is equally divided. During the non-irrigation season the water is equally divided.

Keep Gauging Stations

Provision is made for keeping a daily record of the flow of the rivers by measurement at all the gauging stations at the boundary at all places where any of the water, which would naturally flow across the boundary are diverted or stored or the natural flow increased or decreased. Each country may receive its share of water at such points as desired. International gauging stations are to be maintained at St. Mary's on the north and south branches of the Milk river, on Lodge creek, Battie creek and Bismarck river near the international boundary, and on the Milk river western crossing and at such other points as the commission may approve.

GERMANS SIGN

Weisbaden, Oct. 6.—(By The Associated Press.)—An agreement whereby the German government is to deliver to France within three years seven billion gold marks worth of building materials, was signed here Thursday by Louis Locheur, French minister of the liberated regions, and Walter Rathenau, German minister of reconstruction. The signing of the agreement was reported by the Associated Press.

There, in the third, he brought the crowd to its feet with his brilliant performance in grabbing a difficult grounder from McNally, throwing himself at the ball and then, while flat on the ground, reaching up and tagging Walter Pipp, who was tearing for third.

Ruth Given Pass.

Coach Leary, of the Yankees, ran out from the dugout and drew Empire Morarity's attention to the ball. The umpire examined it and threw it out of the game. Pitcher Nehf took no chances with the home run hitter and passed him to first, filling the bases. This brought up Bob Meusel, another hard hitter, but the best he could do was send up a short fly to Bancroft, leaving the three base runners stranded.

Financial Inability Is Plea of Railroads

Washington, Oct. 6.—Financial inability to reduce freight rates was pleaded by railroad witnesses appearing Thursday at hearings before the interstate commerce commission to oppose application of eastern, southern and northern hardwood producers for general reduction of tariffs on their products.

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
