

# National Women Leaders to Discuss Armaments Here Tuesday

Members of the leading women's and men's clubs of Great Falls will extend the hospitality of the city to four national officers of the League of Women Voters and Mrs. A. F. Rice of Butte, president of the state branch, when they arrive in Great Falls next Tuesday.

The four distinguished visitors are touring Montana under the direction of the National League of Women Voters for the purpose of emphasizing the importance of the international conference on the reduction of armaments which President Harding has called to be held in Washington, November 11.

Mrs. Sumner T. McKnight, who recently returned from an extended trip in Europe where she studied conditions in countries that are bearing heavy tax burdens to support armies and navies, and who is said to be one of the ablest speakers in the ranks of league members, will be the principal speaker at the meeting to be held in the ball room of Hotel Rainbow Tuesday evening.

**Mrs. Paige Also Coming.**

She is accompanied by Mrs. James Paige of Minneapolis, fifth regional director of the league, who also will speak. Since Mrs. Paige was in Great Falls in 1920 when the women's voters' league of this city was organized, she has visited league organizations in 18 other states and in her address here, will tell something of the progress made by women in political matters since they were enfranchised.

Mrs. Rice will speak on the "Reduction of Armaments from Montana's Viewpoint."

Mrs. Gifford Pinchot, national finance chairman, and Mrs. Margaret Wood Park, active chairman, also will be in attendance at the meeting. They are both clubwomen of distinction in the east.

A meeting of the directors of the Great Falls women's voters league will be held at Hotel Rainbow at noon Tuesday, which will be attended by Mrs. McKnight, Mrs. Paige, Mrs. Pinchot and Mrs. Park. At this meeting delegates will be elected to the second annual convention of the fifth region of the national league, which is to be held in Des Moines, Ia., November 21 and 22.

**Business Women Entertain.**

Due to the effort of Miss Hazel Davis, president of the Business and Professional Woman's club which is in charge of the entertainment during this visit, the co-operation of the leading clubs of the city has been secured and a large attendance is expected.

The party will go through Great Falls Sunday on their way to Butte and will be met by several club representatives at that time when plans for Tuesday's program will take a more definite form. Under ordinary circumstances the local branch of the League of Women's Voters meets here in June, 1920, would have arranged this entertainment, but because of not having yet organized for the year, the responsibility was turned over to the business women.

A dinner had been planned at the Hotel Rainbow, Tuesday evening at which both Mrs. McKnight and Mrs. Sumner will speak on "The Reduction of Armaments." The afternoon meeting to be held in Edison hall, will be under the auspices of the Woman's

club and the Delphian society. It is the privilege of every woman in Great Falls, whether she is a member of a club organization or not, to attend these meetings.

**Mrs. Norris, State Chairman**

Mrs. E. L. Norris of this city will attend the meeting Tuesday in the capacity of honorary state chairman. Mrs. C. C. Sadler of Great Falls, who was first state chairman, and Mrs. A. L. Jenkins, present district chairman, also will attend the meetings.

The National League of Woman Voters is yet an organization in its infancy. It was organized in February, 1920, following the long hard fight for suffrage, and has become a substantial unit in 48 states. Due to the eagerness with which it was so readily recognized as an organization which held definite aims toward which its members worked and have been successful, the dreams of its founders have been more than realized.

Those lacking a knowledge for which the league stands are prone to judge it as a third party, a woman's party. This opinion is not correct. The two things that it stands for are: First—To educate the women in the intelligent use of the ballot, through non-partisan schools or courses in citizenship; and second—To educate and interest women in legislation, local, state and federal, that they may understand and work for that which will better the nation.

Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt is honorary chairman of the organization. The active chairman is Mrs. Maud Wood Park. Mrs. George Gehorn, St. Louis, is vice chairman and acting director of organization; Mrs. Solon Jacobs, Birmingham, Ala., is secretary, and Mrs. Richard Edwards, Peru, Ind., is treasurer.

**Montana in Fifth Region.**

According to geographical location, the country is divided into regions each having a regional director. The fifth region, of which Mrs. Paige is director, is composed of Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and Iowa.

Legislation is handled by seven committees and includes those phases of government relating to the working and living conditions for women, such as the laws concerning the civic status of women, and those pertaining to social hygiene, supply and demand of food, citizenship and the Americanization of foreigners.

The national headquarters in Washington, D. C., in the Munsey building where certain bills introduced in congress are endorsed or opposed by this organization.

Suggestions are made by the national organization for state activities and reports on bills being considered in congress are sent out to chairmen all over the country.

Instruction along educational lines to voters is afforded through citizenship schools which, when first organized, were designed to train women from various states to organize schools of their own in the respective states, and at the last minute, the last school showed an attendance of from four to seven hundred students.

The first annual convention was held last April in Cleveland, Ohio.

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## Washington Society

Washington, Oct. 8.—The winter's campaign is being mapped out by Washington's society "generals" now that Mrs. Warren G. Harding has known the dates for entertainments at the White House during the winter. Mrs. Harding and her social secretary, Miss Laura Harlan, realize how important it is to have the hostesses to know the social program of the White House as early as possible, very thoughtfully got together and worked hard on the matter and the announcements earlier than usual.

No entertaining in honor of the delegates to the armament conference was included on the calendar, but it is safe to predict that at least one reception will be given by President and Mrs. Harding especially in their honor and perhaps a dinner or two also. It is also probable that a series of musicales and informal tea parties will be given at the White House, though they are not on the calendar either.

**New Year's Reception Revived**

Only the dates of the state functions were announced and perhaps the one of the widest interest is the New Year's reception, when anyone without an invitation and regardless of class, can go to the executive mansion and shake the president in the arms of the lady of the land by the hand and rub elbows with the highest. President Wilson abolished the timehonored custom of holding open the White House on New Year's day so the news of its revival is received with great glee.

I suppose that the reception will be patterned after those of the past, when the cabinet members, the diplomatic corps, the members of the supreme court and other high officials head the line and are received first, the other guests coming in the order of their arrival—"first come, first served"—though they usually have to stand in line for hours before reaching their hostess, and the line seems endless and generally lasts through the greater part of the day.

Those receptions are certainly an awful physical strain on the president and his wife, but they are perhaps the most interesting and colorful occasions of each year. The brilliant uniforms of the diplomats and of the army and naval officers, the red coats

of the marine band which always furnishes the music for those functions, and the gowns of the women and the variety of types of humanity gathered together there, all tend to make it a never-to-be-forgotten scene. As New Year's comes on a Sunday this year, the reception will be given on Monday, January 2.

**Mrs. Harding Receives Callers**

Mrs. Harding has already begun to receive callers by appointment every afternoon when not engaged, otherwise and received several days last week a number of ladies of the diplomatic, official and residential circles.

She began that pleasant custom almost immediately after going to the White House and continued up into the warm weather. President and Mrs. Harding have also resumed their nice habit of inviting people informally, and at the last minute, to have luncheon with them, usually people who are calling there for one reason or another about luncheon time.

**Ladies of Senate Reassemble**

She did, however, attend the re-assembling of the ladies of the senate last Tuesday, an organization which was formed by Mrs. Marshall, the first president during the war, to do war work, and which developed into a charming informal weekly get-together meeting with picnic luncheons. Tuesday's gathering was the first of this season since congressional recess. Mrs. Coolidge succeeded Mrs. Marshall, of course, as president, as the wife of the president is ex-officio president of the ladies of the senate, who always meet in the same office building.
