NO STATE HELP PROMISED FISH HATCHERY HERE


Commission Accepts Power Company's Offer, But Makes No Appropriation.

Ruth Is Out of Series Because of Arm; Joins Spectators in Stand

Crowds Fail to Recognize Crippled Home Run King as He Limp from Players' Bench by Order of Umpire. No Chance to Bat.

New York, Oct. 11.—Babe Ruth reconciled himself Tuesday night to watching the rest of the world series from a seat in the grandstand.

Manager Huggins still clings to a forlorn hope that Babe's arm will heal sufficiently to allow him to make another appearance in uniform before the end of the series.

New York, Oct. 11.—The fact of the doctor ordering Babe Ruth to keep out of the game, owing to his infected arm and leg, put gloom on the horizon of Manager Huggins of the Yankees, before Tuesday's game began.

Huggins declared the Yankees could win without Ruth.

"Hoyt was in great form Monday," said Huggins. "All of us had confidence that the boy would win again.

"Wasn't our Meusel wonderful in the field and at bat?" he inquired.

That was an easy one to answer. Meusel was wonderful—even more so than the box score showed.

This same Meusel it was who stifled a Giant hitting spell in the second round with a beautiful throw to second.

"I believe Ruth was out at first on that punt," he said.

This referred to the little surprise attack by the infant terrible, which started the Yankees toward triumph.

"We lost, and we should have won," was his retrospective summary of the proceedings Monday.

Babe Ruth's bat devoted itself to swatting the results of the afternoon on all occasions save the one that presented him as a master craftsman in the gentle art of bunting, he made no particular showing.

The Giants, despite their setback, were not without sparkling achievements. Frisch kept up his remarkable stick work, holding his series mark at .500 by touching Hoyt for two singles in his four appearances at the plate.
