

STATE MEETING OF RED CROSS HERE OCT. 26

National Officers Will Meet Chapter Chairmen to Outline Program.

The chapters of the home service section of the American Red Cross of northern Montana and possibly of the entire state, will hold a regional convention in Great Falls October 26, according to word received Saturday from the Chicago central division offices by H. O. Chown, chairman of the Cascade county chapter, and Mrs. Harriet Carrier, secretary. Walter Davidson, of Chicago, manager of the central division of the Red Cross, will preside at the conference and it is expected that other officials of the central division will attend.

Will Consider Progress.

The nature of the conference according to Mr. Chown, who returned last week from the national conference of the Red Cross at Columbus, Ohio, has not been fully announced, but it is likely that the new program of the organization will be considered. The conference will undoubtedly cover all phases of Red Cross work, including both home and foreign service and principally a completion of the work for the benefit of former service men.

All phases of Red Cross activity were considered at the national conference, according to Mr. Chown, which covered a period of three days. Dr. Livingston Ferrand, then national president, was in charge of the conference and the appointment of Judge J. B. Payne of Ohio as the new national president was announced. Dr. Ferrand resigned to accept the presidency of Cornell university and Judge Payne was appointed by President Harding to fill the vacancy.

35,000 in Pageant.

The national conference was closed with a gorgeous pageant, according to Mr. Chown, in which 35,000 participated. It was given at the Coliseum in Columbus by parties from Columbus and Washington, D. C., and one of the features of the occasion was singing by a chorus of 1,000 voices.

Mrs. Carrier announced Saturday that the women of the Ulm community would give a chicken dinner at Ulm Sunday, October 23, for the benefit of the Cascade chapter of the Red Cross and residents of Great Falls have been invited to attend. This will be one of the opening events in the chapter's drive for funds in the coming roll call of chapters throughout the country. The dinner will start at noon and continue until 6 o'clock.

Mrs. Leonard Sanford of Ulm will be in charge of the dinner, which will be given at the Ulm store. She will be assisted by Mr. Sanford and J. B. Leggat.

Brother Assaults Brother When Asked to Go Home, Charge

Art Hanson, also known as "Swede" Hanson, a stage hand, was arrested Saturday night by Deputy Sheriff Fred Huotari and lodged in the county jail on a charge of assault and battery. The charge was preferred by "Baldy" Hanson, a brother of the prisoner, who came to the county jail earlier in the evening, showing evidence of rough handling.
