

U. S. Honor Medal Placed on Tomb of English "Unknown Soldier"

HARVEY MAKES PRESENTATION IN OLD ABBEY

General Pershing and Complete Battalion From Coblenz There.

Lloyd George Responds for British Government and People.

London, Oct. 17.—(By The Associated Press.)—Upon the simply inscribed slab in Westminster Abbey which marks the tomb of Great Britain's "unknown warrior" was laid Monday, the highest decoration within the gift of American people. It was the medal of honor, voted by the congress of the United States in reaffirmation of the comradeship which united the United States and Great Britain in world war. The official presentation was made by George Harvey, American ambassador to the court of St. James, who delivered a brief address representing the American government and President Harding.

General Pershing, accompanied by Major Oscar N. Sahlbert, military attaché; Vice Admiral Albert P. Niblack and Rear Admiral Nathan C. Twining, left the American embassy and entered a royal carriage which, with an escort of mounted police, drove to the precincts of the abbey. There it met a part of the American composite battalion, which arrived Sunday from Coblenz. With the Americans were drawn up officers and men from the royal navy, contingents of the royal air force, the grenadiers, coldstream, Scottish and Welsh guards, and a detachment of territorials.

Salute for Pershing. General Pershing's arrival had been preceded a few minutes by that of the duke of Connaught, who was accorded the royal salute and the British national anthem. General Pershing was received with the general's salute, the bands playing the Star Spangled Banner.

After a prayer by the dean of the abbey, the procession moved to the grave of the "Unknown Soldier". After the medal had been bestowed, the dean, in a brief address, accepted it, and the playing of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" and the American and British anthems concluded the ceremony.

Leaving the abbey the duke and General Pershing were given the royal salute and the masses of the American national anthem.

"One cannot enter here and not feel overpowering emotion in recalling the

important events in the history of Great Britain that have shaped the progress of nations," said General Pershing in bestowing the medal. "Distinguished men and women are resting here, who through centuries have unselfishly given their services and their lives to make that record glorious. As they pass in memory before us there is none whose deeds are more worthy and none whose devotion inspires our admiration more than this unknown warrior.

Symbol of Sacrifice. "He will always remain the symbol of the tremendous sacrifice by his people in the world's greatest sacrifice.

"As we solemnly gather about the sepulchre the hearts of the American people join in this tribute to their English speaking kinsmen. Let us participate by the occasion and under its inspiration pledge anew our trust in the God of our fathers, that his may guide and direct our faltering footsteps into the paths of permanent peace."

Mr. Lloyd George, the prime minister, who headed the cabinet members attending the ceremony, said: "It is my special privilege on behalf of the government and the people of this country to express their profound gratitude to the president and congress of the United States of America for this striking act of homage to our valiant comrade.

Thanks American People. "The action of the president and congress has deeply stirred our hearts. We know the value of this medal. We know how jealously its worth has been guarded. We know, in fact, the highest distinction which the great republic can confer on valor among its sons, and we also know that for two generations it has been consecrated to our valiant warriors with deeds of conspicuous heroism amongst a conspicuously brave people.

"We thank the American people for conferring this, the highest tribute of honor in the command, upon the poor remains of a humble and obscure British warrior who gave his life for a noble cause. We thank them for conferring the medal of honor through the hands of the distinguished soldier who played such a noble part in the final triumph. We thank the ambassador of the United States for his eloquent words.

America Espoused Cause. "This empire to its remotest corners will not miss the deep significance of this deed of the day. We feel we are taking part in no idle pageant. The warrior who rests in this sacred tomb is but the representative of nearly one million British dead, from many continents, who gave their lives freely, not only for the honor of their native lands but for human freedom in all lands.

The cause for which they fell, America espoused in a critical hour and helped to carry to victory, so that the honor laid today on this grave will remain an emblem of common sacrifice for a common purpose. It will be a reminder not only to this generation, but for all generations to come, that the fundamental aims of these two democracies are the same, and will be interpreted as a solemn pledge given to the valiant deed that these two mighty peoples who are comrades in the great war have resolved to remain comrades to guarantee a great peace.

Walsh Amendments to German Treaty Smashed by Senate

Washington, Oct. 17.—The first senate roll call on the German peace treaty was taken Monday and resulted in a 71 to 7 rejection of the first amendment offered, a proposal by Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, to have the United States join the other powers in a pledge to protect Germany against unwarranted invasion.

All Republicans and a large majority of the Democrats, opposed the Walsh amendment, the first attempt to amend the treaty. The seven supporters of the amendment, all Democrats, were Senators Culliver, Nebraska; King, Utah; Overman and Simmons, North Carolina, and Walsh, Montana.

The senate also rejected by 52 to 6 a second amendment by Senator Walsh proposing that the United States would use its good offices in the event of a wanted attack on Germany.

Weather Conditions—Pacific Slope, Northwest and Canadian Northwest. The low pressure area that was over Manitoba Sunday, is now central in the lake region and another disturbance which is well defined is over Alberta. Barometers are much lower over western Canada with Edmonton reporting a pressure of 28.28 inches. Rain is reported from northwest Montana westward to the coast and unsettled weather is general over Montana with normal temperatures prevailing over most of the northwest.

Montana Forecast. Generally fair Tuesday, cooler east of the divide; Wednesday generally fair except rain in extreme northwest portion.

THREE BURN TO DEATH. Dallas, Tex., Oct. 17.—Three persons were burned to death and at least seven injured, two probably fatally, in a fire which destroyed a boarding house here early Monday. There were 30 persons in the house, a number of whom only escaped by jumping from upstairs windows.

BRUMFIELD'S MIND'S BLANK AS TO MURDER

Dentist, on Stand in His Own Defense, Tells of Stranger Who Aided.

Wife as Witness, Says She Thinks Husband Not in Right Senses.

Roseburg, Ore., Oct. 17.—Dr. R. M. Brumfield took the witness stand Monday in his own defense at his trial for the alleged murder of Dennis Russell, following his wife, who declared her belief that her husband was not in his right mind at the time of his disappearance July 13.

Dr. Brumfield's story was that of a man whose memory is a blank, pierced now and again by brief, vivid but indistinct lightning flashes of memory.

Through all of his recollections ran the shadowy figure of a stranger, a man who saw he was not himself and took him under his wing—and who bore a ghostly resemblance to Russell, who, the state claims, was his victim.

"Now, tell all you know about this matter," said Dexter Rice, chief attorney as Dr. Brumfield took the stand.

For 20 minutes the accused dentist talked, calmly, with folded arms, facing the jury.

Lesses His Identity. "A few times, I can remember some things," he said on cross examination, "although I did not know who I was. Then the next thing I remembered distinctly I was on a train. Percy Webb said, 'do you know who I am?' and I said 'Yes, Percy Webb.'"

The mysterious man made his first appearance in a Portland restaurant—he did not remember which one—Brumfield said. The stranger, apparently the same one, took care of him at Blaine, Wash., and Vancouver, B. C. His descriptions of the stranger were somewhat at variance.
