

KOMMERS HALTS GORDON'S BILL ON MILEAGE FEE

Board Disagrees on Allowance of Expense Claim; Bennet Approves Account.

Differences of opinion between County Commissioners Ben C. Johnston and L. H. Kommers regarding the allowance of an expense account incurred by Sheriff Job Gordon on his recent trip to Canada for a prisoner has resulted in the placing of the matter before County Attorney H. G. Bennet for an interpretation of the law. Commissioner Kommers objected to the entire bill, but the disagreement principally involved a bill of about \$190 for mileage fees. It was stated, Commissioner J. R. Bennett has not been present at the board's sessions for several weeks because of illness.

Bennet Approves Bill

Although County Attorney Bennet has presented no written opinion to the board, it is understood that he has verbally advised Chairman Johnston in his belief that the bill should be allowed. When the account was brought before the board for consideration, Commissioner Kommers presented his disapproval across the face of it, on the grounds that no statute permitted the sanction of mileage fees because extradition papers were not used in returning the prisoner from Canada.

Find a Precedent

County Attorney Bennet said Saturday that he had based his opinion on a decision rendered several years ago by Judge Albert J. Gale, then attorney general, in a case exactly similar to the one presented by the commissioners. The case involved a sheriff of Dawson county who went to North Dakota for a prisoner without having extradition papers. The court authorized the payment of the sheriff's expenses.

Bill Is Held Up

County Attorney Bennet has referred his opinion to Attorney General Wellington D. Rankin for confirmation and he is strongly of the opinion that the state's attorney will uphold him. Sheriff Gordon's expense account will be held in abeyance until a decision is received from Helena.


Through a special system of ventilation without ice-spikes, fresh fruits are being carried from the Pacific coast by boat.

200 DISABLED MEN NOW APPEAR WHO DID NOT FILE CLAIMS HERE WITH GOVERNMENT CLEANUP SQUAD

The cases of 200 former service men who did not appear before the cleanup squad of the veterans' bureau in Great Falls and who are entitled to government compensation for disabilities received during the war have been brought to the attention of the Cascade county chapter of the Red Cross, according to Mrs. Harriet Carrier, secretary. Many of the applicants, according to Mrs. Carrier, are in need of the assistance which is due them because of service disabilities, but they have never availed themselves of the opportunity of presenting their cases to the regional office and none of them had their claims before the squad when the cases of former service men of Cascade, Chouteau, Pondera and Teton counties were under consideration.

New Claims Filed Daily

The files of cases of 550 former service men were on record in the offices of the Red Cross at the time of the visit of the cleanup squad, according to Mrs. Carrier, and each day a number of new cases are added. An effort was made by the Red Cross to have every man in the four counties before the board during its visit in Great Falls, but indications are that many failed to take advantage of the opportunity to file their claims.

Barred Evidence Not Admissible on Cross Examination Either

Helena, Oct. 29.—Repetition on cross-examination of evidence to which objection has been made when presented in direct examination does not serve to cure such evidence of its objectionable features. Such is the holding of the supreme court in a decision handed down Thursday in the case of the First National bank of Reeder, N. D., against A. S. Middleton, sheriff of Custer county, and M. E. Jones, sheriff of Fallon county. By this decision the judgment of the district court in Custer county and its order denying a new trial are reversed and the cause remanded for a new trial.
