HOTEL BLAZE INVESTIGATED BY R. MENTRUM

Authorities Ask State Fire Marshal to Inquire Into Fort Shaw Blaze.

Authorities tried all day Friday to get in communication with Robert Mentrum, state fire marshal, to advise him of the fire which destroyed the Fort Shaw hotel and a blacksmith shop early Thursday morning. Because of the suspicion that the fire was of incendiary origin, authorities believe that a thorough inspection by the state fire marshal is necessary.

Carl Nelson, who was arrested at Fort Shaw, following the fire, is still being held for investigation. Representatives of the Cascade chapter of the Red Cross interviewed him Friday regarding the report that he had been severely gassed and shell shocked while in service in France.

Nelson said he had made no statements that he was a former service man and he explained that he had been gassed twice while working at the Great Falls smelter during the period of the war. His nervousness, he said, was caused by St. Vitus dance, from which he has been a sufferer for many years.

The prisoner again denied that he had started the fire at Fort Shaw. Nelson, it is alleged, was the only one to escape from the fire fully dressed.

Two automobiles collided Friday evening at the corner of Second avenue north and Fourth street with the result that Miss Kincaid, sister of Clarence Kincaid, 107 First avenue north, was catapulted from the car to the pavement. She was taken immediately to her home, where it was found that her injuries were not serious. Kincaid was slightly injured.

The Kincaid machine, traveling north along Fourth street, hit the Packard automobile driven by Katherine Gies, daughter of Charles Gies, 425 Third avenue north, which was going in a westerly direction on Second avenue. Officer J. L. Baltazor was called to investigate the collision, but he made no arrests. He reported to police headquarters that the Gies machine had the right-of-way. Neither car was badly damaged.

ABRAMS WILL BRING JERRY RICE BACK


