SPECIAL WINDOW DISPLAYS GREET TEACHERS IN CITY FOR CONVENTION; LATCH STRING OUT AT ALL STORES

Special window displays for "teachers' convention" are being shown by many of the Great Falls merchants and manufacturers. The Great Falls Ad club is co-operating with some of the leading industrial concerns in placing before the public simple, direct and concise statements regarding the products made by those concerns. Vacant store rooms in the Liberty and Steele buildings have been hailed into service and in the windows attractive charts bearing photos and placards give the passerby some understanding of the nature of the products made locally. The Montana Flour Mills company is displaying its products in one of the windows of the Steele building. Here are shown the Ceretana brand of flour products, samples of each being on display. A showing of the raw wheat from which "It's the Wheat" flour is made brings to the attention of the observer the phases of the flour industry in which the Montana Mills company specializes.

Foundry Display The Great Falls Foundry & Machinery company is occupying another window in the Steele building locally. The Great Falls Iron works is showing photographs of the various products of its plant, in a Third street window of the Liberty building. In another window of the Liberty building, the Great Falls Meat company is showing the products of that concern. Individual displays in the various stores include an attractive dining room scene at Strain brothers. A perfectly appointed table is the central figure of the scene, and every article of silver, linen, chinaware and cutlery, as well as the fruit bowl and its contents were taken from the stock of the Strain store. A buffet ornamented with appropriate pieces of glassware and cutlery and ornaments with two graceful vases containing metallic flowers, and a complete array of all carving utensils, complete the scene. COURT ORDERS AUTO RETAINED BY DEFENDANTS

Court Instructs Jury to Find Against Pearl Miller in Rose Car Case.

A district court jury, in compliance with instructions from Judge H. H. Ewing, Monday found for the defendants in a claim and delivery action brought by Pearl Miller against R. J. Reynolds and Sheriff Bob Gordon, who seized a Studebaker automobile claimed by the plaintiff as her property. Judge Ewing sustained the motion of counsel for the defendants for a directed verdict. The automobile was seized under a writ of attachment from Charles R. Rose. She immediately filed a complaint alleging that the machine was her property. In the complaint, she asked for the return of the machine, or \$100, and \$250 damages. The verdict in the case was returned Monday afternoon, a short time after court had resumed.

McCoy Given Verdict Paul V. McCoy, defendant in a contract suit brought by B. P. McNair and L. F. Rutherford, was given the verdict returned Monday morning by the jury. It was a sealed verdict, the jury determining its finding Saturday night. McCoy was sued for approximately \$4000 on a guarantee he is alleged to have given the plaintiff when they became associated with him in the now defunct McCoy department store.

Testimony in the note action of Matilda Lindsay against Clara McCarthy was completed Monday afternoon and argument will be heard today (Tuesday) by Judge J. B. Leslie and jury. Promissory notes, aggregating \$5000, are the issue of the action. The defendant admits signing the paper, but she claims that she attached her signature while irresponsible.

Continue Stepech Case Owing to the fact that M. J. Ryan, an important witness for the state, cannot be present, the case of the state against Tony Stepech, charging sale of intoxicating liquors, was continued Monday on the motion of County Attorney Howard G. Bennett. The case will be re-set at the end of the calendar. Ryan, a federal agent, is now in Sheridan, Wyo., as a witness in a murder trial. The Stepech case was scheduled to be tried today (Tuesday).

On stipulation between County Attorney Bennett and counsel for Steve Matecko, charged with grand larceny, the case was ordered continued. The trial was on Tuesday's calendar. Counsel for the defendant promised County Attorney Bennett that Matecko would be taken before one of the justice courts to enter a plea of guilty to a charge of petit larceny. Matecko is accused of stealing and killing a calf, the value of which was not sufficient to warrant a grand larceny charge, it was said at the county attorney's office.

Continue City Cases Nineteen appeals from police court verdicts, the majority of them involving defendants who were arrested and fined for alleged offenses committed during the city labor disturbance last summer, were ordered continued for the term Monday. Actions vacated from the calendar were the collection action brought by I. M. Fishbaugh against Lavera Fishbaugh, the foreclosure action brought by the Great Falls Brick & Tile company against Charles Kline and others, and the foreclosure suit brought by Charles Kline against W. A. Weigand and others.

Cases dismissed without prejudice were the claim and delivery action brought by the Great Northern railway against Robert L. Rowell, the conversion action brought by the First National bank of Carter against the Genou State bank and others, and the justice case of Mathew P. Flannigan against Floyd Riach and others.

SUPREME COURT OUST ARIZONA LAND CASE
