HIGHWAY MAN IDENTIFIED BY TWO WOMAN VICTIMS

Miss Eleanor Olson and Mrs. Paul Graves Declare Clarence Alleman Is Man Who Slugged and Robbed Them.

Miss Eleanor Olson, 721 Seventh avenue south, and Mrs. Paul Graves, 307 Fifth street southwest, Monday positively identified Clarence Alleman, alias Holman as the man who assaulted and then robbed them of money and valuables on Thursday and Saturday nights respectively, of last week. Mrs. J. L. Johnson, the man who was held at 726 Fifth avenue south, where he was held earlier in the week, appeared at the county jail, where Alleman is confined, and looked the prisoner over but they were not certain that he was their assailant.

At the end of a day spent solely in investigating the charge against Alleman, County Attorney Howard Bennet announced Monday afternoon that he would file a charge of highway robbery against the man, believing that a severe penalty can be secured under this information than under one charging criminal assault. Mr. Bennet declared he secured enough admissions from Alleman to assure his conviction. The prisoner, it was asserted, admitted that he was in the neighborhood of the spot where Mrs. Graves was robbed and beaten on Saturday night.

To determine his mental condition, Mr. Bennet had Dr. C. J. Bresse give Alleman a thorough examination, which established to the satisfaction of authorities that the man is of sound mind.

County Attorney Bennet will continue his investigation for several days, interviewing three witnesses who could not be secured Monday. The highway robbery charge against Alleman will probably be filed Friday, he said, and he added that the trial would be held during the present term of the district court.

Threatened in Canada Alleman told Mr. Bennet that he had been illegally deported from Canada. He said he owned property in Edmonton, Canada, and had been compelled to desert it because of threats of several neighbors. County Attorney Bennet said he had secured information to the effect that Alleman had been convicted of a petit larceny charge in the dominion and also that he had been taken into custody in Teton county, where he had been recently. Alleman told Mr. Bennet that in was formerly married and had been divorced.

The prisoner, according to investigations made by the police and the county attorney's office, has been sleeping in a room at the corner of Fourth street and Fifth street. This information together with the identification of Alleman by two of his victims, is considered of the highest importance by authorities that the prisoner is proof of a series of robberies that have occurred during the past 10 days, in each case the victim being a woman. With the exception of the last holding, all of the women have been robbed on streets and avenues in close vicinity to the paint shop where Alleman made his bed.
