LEONARD OUTPOINTS SAILOR FRIEDMAN IN EIGHT ROUNDS

Lightweight Champion Enters Ring at 138 3-4 and Opponent at 140 Pounds.

Philadelphia, Nov. 22.—Benny Leonard, lightweight boxing champion of the world, outpointed Sailor Friedman of Chicago, in an eight round, no-decision bout Tuesday night.

Round One Leonard landed a right to the jaw in a clinch. Leonard clipped Friedman on the jaw with a left hook. The champion sent a light right to the jaw in a blow during the round.

Round Two Leonard missed a right for the head and Friedman countered with a left to the jaw. They boxed swiftly and Leonard landed a right and a left to the

Willie Hoppe Loses to Jack Schaefer, Title in Balance

Chicago, Nov. 22.—Willie Hoppe, world's 182 lb. billiard champion, lost his first championship match since 1912, when he defeated Tuesday night by Jack Schaefer of Chicago, 400 to 26, in the international tournament being held here.

Round Six Leonard countered a straight left to the jaw with a hard left uppercut. The champion missed repeatedly. Friedman shook the champion with a left to the jaw. They exchanged light blows at close quarters and in the breakaway Leonard sent a left to the chin at the bell.

Round Seven The fighting became fierce with Friedman as the aggressor. He sent hard rights and lefts to the champion's head and body, forcing him to the ropes. Leonard sent a straight right to the jaw. They started slugging and both took hard body punches. Leonard forced Friedman to the rope, appearing to be trying for a knockout.

Round Eight Leonard staggered Friedman with rights and lefts to the head and Friedman fought back viciously. Leonard's punches seemed to be wearing down his opponent. They continued to box at a fast pace, and Leonard forced Friedman into his own corner at the bell.

Noted Musher Drowns in Canada Wilderness; Racing Dogs With Him

The Pas, Man., Nov. 22.—(By Canadian Press.)—Walter Goyne, winner of the 1920 Canadian dog derby and known as the "going kid of Alaska," was drowned in Moose lake, 80 miles from The Pas, on November 13, it has just become known here.

On that date, Goyne set out from the Dupas trading post at Moose lake for a fishing camp, 25 miles distant, to secure fish for his dogs. He was driving nine dogs, attached to a heavy racing sleigh, and was followed by 11 pups.

Several days later the 11 pups returned to Dupas and the people there became apprehensive. Goyne's tracks were followed for 18 miles, where they disappeared and the general belief being that he encountered thin ice at that point and went, with his dogs and sleigh, through the ice.

QUARTER OF MILE DRIVE BY GOLFER SETS AMATEUR MARK

Scott Scammell, Trenton, N. J., Makes Titanic Stroke Over Spring Lake Course.

New York, Nov. 22.—Scott Scammell, an amateur golfer of Trenton, N. J., recently drove a ball one-quarter of a mile, Scammell performed the feat at the ninth hole during a round of the Homestead course at Hot Spring lake professional. Of this titanic stroke Scammell stated that the ground was very dry; also that he had to make a carry of 300 yards to reach a point on the hill where the rubber core could get over. Once beyond that high spot the fairway sloped toward the green.

In a letter to the Spring Lake "pro," Scammell wrote that the drive was accomplished with one of the famous Scotch drivers imported by Ferguson.

OLYMPIC GAMES SITE NOT CHOSEN IN PARIS AS YET

Pershing Stadium too Small Is Verdict and New Grounds May Be Constructed.

Paris, Nov. 22.—The exact site of the Olympic games in 1924 in Paris remains uncertain, and there has been considerable controversy in sporting circles as to where exactly the games should be held.

The Olympic games committee consider that 15 million would be sufficient to provide a stadium, swimming bath, 15 tennis courts, fencing and boxing arena, and other requirements.


