COLUMBIA PLANS 150 POUND CREW FOR COMING YEAR

Probably Will Be Entered in American Henley to Be Rowed at Philadelphia.

New York, Nov. 24.—Columbia university has decided to join the ranks of the colleges which have organized 150 pound crews for intercollegiate competition.

Plan Modest Schedule A modest schedule will be arranged for Columbia's bantamweight crew. It is possible that one of M. I. T.'s lighter eights will be met, and it is also likely that the 150 pound Columbians will be entered in the American Henley, where they will meet crews from nearly every big university in the east that goes in for rowing.

He really belongs in the featherweight class, and if he is compelled to make the 118 pounds he will not be at all dangerous.

MISSOULA TAKES TITLE IN STATE FOOTBALL BY DEFEATING FALLS 3-0

Captain MacSpadden of Visitors Wins State Championship for His Team by Booting Ball Between Posts From Placement.

Led by Captain Ted Peterson, the Blue and White charges of Coach M. L. Crouch outplayed the visiting Missoula high school eleven at Earling Park Thanksgiving afternoon in a desperate attempt to grasp the state high school championship, but the toe of Captain MacSpadden, right end for the visitors, proved disastrous to the hopes of the Great Falls boys and a kick from placement in the third quarter, missing the bar by merely an inch, won the game and the Montana high school championship for Missoula by a score of 3 to 0.

Although defeated by Coach Conrad Orr's boys, the Great Falls players are entitled to a word of credit for the style of game they staged. Entering the game with the odds against them, they not only held the visitors on equal terms during the game, but in the first half outplayed them at every stage. It was only toward the end of the first half that the Missoulians asserted themselves and when the whistle blew the ball was on the Great Falls three yard line, but during the other part of the half the ball was in the Missoula territory at all times.

Missoula Stronger in Second Half In the second half the Missoula players came back strong and during the two final periods of the game, but the second half passes were tried frequently. Missoula had a little more success with their passes than Great Falls and pulled a number of pretty short passes.

Great Falls gained more ground on straight football than the visitors, but a number of spectacular runs by Kelley and DeVeber, together with MacSpadden's punting, kept the Missoula goal line protected. Bross, kicking for Great Falls, was equally as good as MacSpadden and booted the ball on several occasions for an average of 40 yards.

LEWISTOWN WANTS POST-SEASON GAME WITH GARDEN CITY
