Will Pay Operating Cost of Street Cars Before Debt Interest

San Francisco, Dec. 5.—The United States circuit court of appeal refused Monday to enjoin a proposed action to have the city of Seattle pay the operating cost of its street car system before setting aside a special fund to pay the 5 per cent international \$15,000,000 bond issue which was voted to purchase the system.

The suit was prepared by I. B. Asia and others for the purpose of attacking the contract whereby the city agreed with the Puget Sound Light & Power Co. from which it purchased the trolley system, that it would create the interest fund before meeting operating costs. Asia served notice that he would contest the payment of the operating costs first and the power company appealed to the circuit court.

HOUSE FIGHTS OVER WATERWAY ON FIRST DAY

Democrat Who Asserts Debate Discourteous to President, Is Ignored.

Republicans Plunge Into Discussion of St. Lawrence Project.

Washington, Dec. 5.—Debate was precipitated in the house Monday upon its reconvening for the regular session, on the question of improving the St. Lawrence river as proposed in the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence deep waterway project. Representatives Chalmers of Ohio and A. P. Nelson of Wisconsin, Republicans, favoring the development, while Representatives Griffin, Democrat, and Hicks, Republican, both of New York, opposed it.

The debate was begun over the protest of Representative Montague, Democrat, Virginia, who declared it would be discourteous for the house to enter into discussion of special subjects before hearing President Harding's message.

Representative Chalmers, in favoring the project, said the completion of the deep waterway would make of the Great Lakes a Baltic or Mediterranean sea and bring the Atlantic ocean within 100 miles of the center of population of the United States, while Representative Nelson declared it would mean much for the middle and northwest. The New York state barge canal, he added, was inadequate as an outlet from the Great Lakes to the sea.

Says Barge Canal Enough. Representative Griffin, however, declared the New York barge canal would be adequate as such an outlet for years to come and contended that funds should not be expended on the St. Lawrence project unless the New York canal was shown to be inadequate.

Opposition also was expressed by Representative Hicks. Mr. Griffin expressed the hope that necessity for developing the St. Lawrence would eventually arise, but took the position that the expense should be borne by the Canadian government and by the states in this country that would be benefited.

Propaganda had been widely spread throughout the country, he charged, to prejudice the public against the barge canal, which, he added, was able to compete with any other waterway.

Representative Hicks suggested it might "prove a mistake to put our money on a soil and in a project where we could not control the canal itself."

American ships, if they used the St. Lawrence route, he said, would have to go through foreign territory.

Save Millions, He Claims. Urging development of the St. Lawrence waterway, Representative Nelson declared that on the grain produced within the territory affected, it would bring a saving of approximately \$350,000,000.

"The saving on other commodities will be very great," he continued, "and it may be conservatively estimated that

the producers of the United States will be benefited to the extent of at least \$500,000,000 in return for a total expenditure of less than \$150,000,000, which will be reimbursed to the government in full by the revenue derived from water power."
