vitaly interested in the farmers." Mr. Lovelace declared, "because if the farmers are not successful, the merchants and bankers are broke, along with the rest. We need to take the right kind of farmers back on their feet and the man who has and who works hard will get by and be an asset, instead of a liability."

He declared that the efforts of the association toward the adoption of better farming methods have met with surprising degree of success and that members of the association were silent partners with the dry land farmer. Approximately 300,000 acres, he said, had been pledged in small tracts by farmers for summer fallow and approved methods of tillage.

"In other words," he said, "we hope to accomplish in the next two years what it required from 10 to 20 years in which one conditions similar to those in Montana were prevailing."

President Fred Atkinson of the State college pledged the continued operation and service of the college to agricultural and livestock industries. H. W. Campbell, originator of the Campbell method of soil and crop experimentation, spoke on improved methods of tillage. His address was illustrated by stereopticon slides.
