

ROWELL GUILTY OF SELLING, IS JURY'S VERDICT

Feed Merchant Convicted in District Court; Sentence Left to Judge J. B. Leslie.

Robert Rowell, Great Falls hay and grain dealer, was found guilty of selling intoxicating liquors Tuesday afternoon, the jury leaving the punishment to be fixed by the court. Judge J. B. Leslie, before whom the case was tried, set no definite date for sentencing Rowell, who was remanded to the custody of the sheriff until he is brought into court. The jury considered the evidence about an hour, the case being referred for decision at 3 o'clock. The jury returned the first verdict, since the opening of the jury term, in which the court was charged with fixing the sentence.

H. J. Deuschmann, a rancher living near the Bear Paw mountains, R. H. Swain of Great Falls, and Sheriff Bob Gordon were the witnesses for the state. Under cross examination by Deputy County Attorneys P. A. Ewald and W. J. Tighe, the three witnesses recited the incidents that eventually led to the purchase of a half-gallon of whisky from Rowell on June 28.

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MARTIN ADDRESSES CITY'S MINISTERS

The Rev. J. A. Martin, district superintendent of the First Methodist church, addressed Great Falls ministers at a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. building Tuesday afternoon. His talk was based on the post-war activities of the Methodist church.

The Rev. Mr. Martin recently attended a meeting of 2,500 Methodist ministers in Detroit, where a new program was outlined, more definite good will industries within the church established and the fund for charity and missionary work increased from \$1,000,000 to \$6,000,000.
