

FOUR ORDERED TO JAIL FOR BOOTLEGGING

Fines Also Imposed Upon Three Men and One Woman for Violating Dry Law.

Saturday afternoon brought no joy to at least four people in Great Falls, for there can be no pleasure in appearing before a district judge and receiving sentences for violation of the state prohibition law.

Robert Rowell, Great Falls hay and grain dealer; William Deneen, proprietor of the Canada rooms; Wallace Wheeler, proprietor of the Book Store; and Mrs. Mary Brown, 525 Seventh avenue north, were given terms in the county jail, and ordered to pay fines ranging in amount from \$100 to \$200.

Judge J. B. Leslie pronounced the sentences.

Rowell, who was found guilty by a jury last Tuesday, was sentenced to 90 days in jail and assessed \$200. The jury left the punishment to be fixed by the court. Mrs. Jones, whose fate was also placed in the hands of Judge Leslie by a jury that recommended leniency, was assessed a fine of \$200, and committed to the county jail for a period of 60 days.

Wheeler and Deneen, whose punishment was fixed by the jury at 30 days in jail and \$100 fines, were officially sentenced by the court in accordance with the wish of the jurors.

Deneen was found guilty Saturday afternoon and Wheeler was convicted on Thursday.

Wants Two Days' Credit Rowell and Deneen received their sentences calmly and had nothing to say after the court had spoken.

Wheeler, who had served two days in jail awaiting sentence, contended to the court that he should be given credit for those days when his term was started, but Judge Leslie advised him that the law expressly provided that no defendant could be sentenced within two days after conviction, unless the defendant waived the statutory time, and asked for sentence at the conclusion of the trial.

Judge Leslie told Mrs. Jones that he would have given her 90 days in jail, if it were not for the fact that she is the mother of several children.

"The prohibition law applies to women as well as men," Judge Leslie said, "and there is no reason why it should be enforced any differently in one case than in another. It is the law and while it is the law, it must

be enforced. If the prohibition law is not a popular one, it is the power of the people to remove it from the books. That function does not rest with the court.

"It seems to me that you, as a woman and mother, should be disposed to favor the enforcement of the prohibition law, for its enactment halted the liquor traffic that often brought misery and suffering to mothers and children."

Mrs. Jones told the court that she had lived in Great Falls for several years, and had always made an effort to earn an honest living.

Charges Are Stricken Liquor charges against Tony Step-ech, Clara McGee and Tony Lutchik, were stricken from the court calendar Saturday on motion of the county attorney's office.

The case against George and Lizzie Roy, charged with sale of intoxicating liquors, was ordered continued for the term. Hoyt Wade, charged with a statutory offense, entered a plea of guilty in district court Saturday, and Judge H. H. Ewing ordered him to appear in court Monday morning for sentence.

Wade, several weeks ago pleaded not guilty to the charge. He was brought back from Canada on complaint of relatives of a young girl, who live in Cascade.

Blue Blooded Calf From Missouri Goes to Highwood Herd

Masterpiece 24th, royally bred son of the great Masterpiece, sire of the S. H. Velle Hereford herd at Blue Springs, Mo., was tendered a royal reception when he passed through Great Falls Friday on his way to the Elk Run herd at Highwood. A number of visiting county agents here for the irrigation institute and several other Hereford admirers inspected the calf at the Milwaukee station and after giving him the livestock breeders' "once over" expressed the opinion unanimously that the 10-months-old son of Masterpiece is one of the most promising calves ever brought into the section of the state.

The calf weighs 550 pounds at an even 10 months of age, is just as mel-low a youngster as a Hereford breeder could wish, has a perfect Hereford head, a great spring of ribs and is uniformly well set up, according to the judgment of the breeders who inspected him yesterday.

The calf will be used on the Manly Picture and Bright Picture heifers of the Elk Run herd. He was selected from the S. H. Velle herd by Frank Ledingham. Without special fitting the calf stood fifth among the junior yearlings at the American Royal this year.

ALLEGED THUG WAS DETAINED FOR INSANITY

Clarence Alleman Committed Twice to Michigan Asylum, Officials There Report.

County Attorney Howard G. Bennet Saturday received information to the effect that Clarence Alleman, held in the county jail on a charge of robbing a woman, was twice an inmate in the state hospital for the insane at Traverse City, Michigan.

A telegram, carrying the information, was received from an official of Ionia county, from which Alleman was committed.

Send for Complete Record The message stated that Alleman was first committed to the asylum in 1916 and was again re-committed in 1919. It was not stated whether the man was discharged as cured, and County Attorney Bennet immediately telegraphed state hospital authorities for a complete record of Alleman's incarceration in the asylum.

Great Falls physicians who have examined the prisoner say that he is not mentally unbalanced, but Dr. Hulbush county physician, is quoted as saying that Alleman is mentally deficient and has the mind of a child 12 years of age. It is likely that a commission will be appointed to examine the man's mental condition, said Mr. Bennet.

Insanity Will Be Defense Mr. Bennet said it had not been definitely decided whether Alleman would be brought to trial during the present term of court. If the trial is held on the scheduled date of December 15, acquittal will be asked by the defense on grounds of insanity.

Judge Ewing Orders Land Sale to Satisfy Judgment for \$1,997

Sale of 160 acres of land to satisfy a judgment of \$1,997.80 was ordered Saturday in a decree of foreclosure signed by Judge H. H. Ewing, in favor of Emily B. Leard, and against Frederick H. Bailey and his wife, Jennie Bailey. The suit was brought to enforce payment of a promissory note for \$1,990 and interest, which was executed and delivered by the defendants to the Great Falls National bank, which later assigned it to the plaintiff.

A decree was granted by Judge Ew-

ing in the foreclosure action brought by R. B. Durrin, Great Falls physician, against Harold P. Loomis, J. C. Loomis, William Moeri and the Stockmen's bank, in Cascade. The plaintiff asked for foreclosure of a mortgage on 170 acres near Fort Shaw, and 280 acres in Lewis and Clark county, given as security for a loan of \$1,500 to the defendants on May 1, 1920. Moeri and the bank were named defendants in the action because of alleged interest in the Loomis property.




