NON-SUIT ENDS TRIAL TERM IN DISTRICT COURT Case Against American Bank Thrown Out; No Cause for Action.

On grounds that the complaint did not state a cause of action, Judge J. B. Leslie Monday sustained a motion for judgment of non-suit made by counsel for the defense in the case of W. D. Scott against the American Bank and Trust company. Scott brought action to enforce payment of a check for \$1,100 which he presented at the bank.

2 CASES LEFT FOR TRIAL IN FEDERAL COURT Harvey Noble Trial Postponed Until February; Witness Ill.

With but two cases left on the calendar for this term of federal court, the outlook for Christmas at home for court attaches looked cheerful Monday. Three cases, involving what appeared to be the most sensational of the term, those of Harvey Noble, alleged whiskey runner, caught by Sheriff Bob Gordon, after a wild automobile chase for 50 miles on the night of October 8, and two other Volstead act violations, were vacated for this term of court.

J. N. Thelen, counsel for Noble, asked for a continuance of the trial until the next term of court, on the ground that Herman Maur, a material witness for the defense, was too ill with rheumatism to appear in court. The request was granted by Federal Judge Bourquin.

The other cases vacated by the court on the motion of Deputy United States District Attorney Ronald Higgins were those of James O'Brien and Ole Burg, charged with liquor transportation near Chisnoik in Blaine county.

Yee Hop, an aged Chinese, was arraigned in court Monday morning, charged with selling narcotics in Billings. Gerald Frary was appointed as counsel for the defendant. He will enter a plea this (Tuesday) morning.

Shows Needle Scars Yee Hop told the court that he was 81 years old and trembled as he exhibited a needle scarred arm, following his acknowledgement that he was a confirmed drug addict. He started to tell the court a story of intrigue and injustice, but was told that if he wanted to enter a plea of not guilty he would have to do it through his counsel.

The cases left on the calendar are set for today and Thursday. M. L. Greig and Frank Bourquin charged with transporting liquor in Chouteau county, will be on trial today. Their trial also involves the seizure of their automobile by federal authorities. The procedure against three other automobiles, formerly the property of alleged whiskey runners, was instituted by Attorney Higgins.

Court Case Echoes Day of High Prices Special to The Tribune. Lewistown, Dec. 19.—An echo of the month and food shortage a couple of seasons back which took millions out of Montana is heard in the district court where the case of T. J. McNevin against the Federal Government. The plaintiff sues to recover over \$2,000 for hay shipped in under a contract to provide first class upland hay at \$28.50 a ton at the shipping station. One car was received by Hanna and paid for before he had a chance to inspect the hay, the others being refused on the ground that the hay was coarse and largely unfit for animals and he asks for a refund of \$248 on the car he did take.
