THE TAX LEAGUE MOVEMENT

CHINA'S DEBTS.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 15.—That China's foreign financial obligations should be placed in the same category as other international indebtedness, in case there is hereafter a readjustment of the same or an international moratorium, is a claim which is now being strongly put forward by China's friends.

It is forecast that this claim for the same financial status as the other powers will be pressed by the Chinese delegation, and that they may have American support. This maneuver has the advantage that it would most effectively test the good faith of the European powers in regard to China, and would place the United States government in a very strong tactical position.
