CANADA'S GREATEST ELECTRIC DITCH IS LINKED TO NIAGARA Falls Horse-power Reaches Point Saving 10,000,000 Tons Coal a Year.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Dec. 24.—Water was turned into the Chippewa-Queenstown power canal of the Ontario hydro-electric commission at 4 o'clock Saturday morning.

Completion of the 12 1/2-mile Chippewa-Queenstown channel by the Ontario hydro-commission brings water power development at Niagara Falls to the three-hundred of 1,000 horsepower, equivalent in steam-generated electricity to a coal consumption of more than 10,000,000 tons a year.

Great Cuts in Rock Dredges which have been cutting through earth and rock north from Chippewa and south from Queenstown for 2 1/2 years in a wide swing about the falls, took out 13,200,000 cubic yards of earth and 4,182,000 cubic yards of rock, a total slightly more than the French had removed from Culberta cut at the time the Panama route was taken over by the United States.

The Chippewa-Queenstown canal cost about \$65,000,000. An additional \$15,000,000 will be required to complete installation of the 40-unit generating machinery.

650,000 Horse-Power The output of the super-power plant will be 650,000 horse-power. There are now three plants operating on the Canadian side of the river, with a total output of 450,000 horse-power, so that if all of them are continued in operation, Canada's Niagara production will be over the 1,000,000 horse-power mark.

Existing and projected development on the American side has a potential production of 420,000 horse-power, while on the Canadian side it has been largely in the hands of one corporation, Canada's power has been scattered over a wide field, serving many municipalities within a radius of 250 miles with current for light, heat and power.

The reaching and passing of the million horse-power mark has been accomplished in approximately a quarter of a century, for it was in 1895 that the wheels of the first industrial plant at Niagara Falls were turned by hydro-electric energy. The first turbines on the Canadian side were installed ten years later.

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RADICAL PARTY BORN WITH AIM OF REVOLUTION

With Policeman's Billy as Gavel, Rabid Thinkers of Nation Merge.

Workers Republic Set as Goal of Activity; Six Men Dominate.

New York, Dec. 24.—With a policeman's billy doing duty as the chairman's gavel, a workers' party of America was born here Saturday and dedicated to the overthrow of the present government and the substitution of the "American workers' republic."

Self-styled revolutionary radicals from all parts of the United States attended the organization mass meeting and then opened the party's first national convention.

The 146 delegates announced they would commence being revolutionary by working all day Sunday—Christmas—and scheduled committee meetings for the morning and for the afternoon. After preliminary organization was effected, James F. Cannon, of Kansas City, wielding the billy, as presiding officer, said the party should begin by fighting more and talking less.

Start To Fight At Once Almost immediately several delegates acted upon the suggestion. They were ejected from the hall, after a verbal and fistful exchange. Mr. Cannon then declared he would listen to "no one who talked anything but unity."

A group of six men at a table made all the nominations for committees on behalf of the American labor alliance and the workers' party. Of the 146 delegates, 94 represented the former organization and 13 the latter. Their slates were accepted without discussion.

Mr. Cannon said he lamented that organized labor in America was being broken up by "black reaction," and the "oppression of capitalism," and said the reason for this condition was that union leaders went in for phraseology instead of applying the "Marxian spirit."

Where organizations included "The workers' organization differs from the Communist bureaucracy, the socialists and the social labor party, is that those three don't want to fight," he said, adding:

"We must enroll members who will be solidly with us. We do not want to be sold—so that we will be militant and not a debating society." Among the organizations amalgamated in the workers' party were the Finnish socialist federation, Hungarian workers' federation, Italian workers' federation, Jewish workers' federation and the Workers' Educational association (Arbeiter Bildungsverein).
