He was one of the pioneers of Montana, having an ordinary seating capacity of 65,000 and room for an additional 20,000 temporary seats. Teton Petitioners Ask to Dispense With County Nurse Fairfield, Dec. 26.—Petitions sent from the county seat to be circulated in the Fairfield community ask the Teton county commissioners to do away with the services of a county nurse. The petition recites "That in view of the hard times and high taxes, and the urgent need of retrenchment and the general disposition to dispense with all unnecessary expenditures, we the undersigned taxpayers, respectfully petition your Honorable Board to cut out the expense of county nurse at once."

Stockholders Talk Bank's Affairs at Park Hotel Meeting Discussion of the affairs of the American Bank & Trust Co., which closed December 3, was still in progress at an early hour this morning at a stockholders' meeting at the Park Hotel. Whether a reopening of the bank would be feasible was a question discussed at length, it was stated, and it was anticipated that a final decision would not be reached at this meeting. This meeting was called following the filing of the state bank examiner's report.

Lloyd George Plans Invitation to Russ Ministers, at London London, Dec. 26.—Premiers Lloyd George and Briand have decided in principle to invite the Russian minister, M. Chicherin, and M. Litvinoff, to London early in the New Year, according to the London Times. It is believed they will be asked to give clear answers on very important questions of policy. February 8 is mentioned as the probable date on which the conversations will begin.

Rocky Kansas Wins Over Johnny Ray Pittsburgh, Dec. 26.—Rocky Kansas of Buffalo, N. Y., outpointed Johnny Ray of Pittsburgh in a 10-round non-decision won Monday afternoon, in the opinion of newspaper men at the ringside. Kansas was the aggressor in a majority of rounds. Kansas weighed 135 1/2; Ray, 133 1/2.

Paris Forbids Trip of Former Empress Away From Madeira London, Dec. 26.—The governor of Madeira has received orders from Paris to prevent the departure from the island of the former Empress of Austria Hungary, to Switzerland, according to a Funchal dispatch to the Morning Post.

Trusty Who Released Warden Is Pardoned Little Rock, Ark., Dec. 26.—The state penitentiary commission announced that a parole has been granted Horace Hays, of Hot Springs, 22, trusty convict who liberated Warden E. H. Dempsey, of the state prison, and his family from the death cell after they had been locked up by Tom Slaughter, bandit, in his recent sensational escape from prison.

See New Agitation in Italy From Case of Sacco and Vanzetti London, Dec. 26.—Italian newspapers condemn the refusal of Judge Phelan, of Dedham, Mass., to grant a retrial to Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, who were convicted last summer, of murder, in the first degree, of a Boston police officer. The Central News agency Monday from its Rome correspondent. The dispatch says the Rome newspapers predict a new agitation throughout Italy on behalf of the prisoners.

Label Suit Against Polson Editor Is Dismissed by Court Kalispell, Dec. 26.—The case of the State against C. P. TEXAS RANGER SHOT Marfa, Texas, Dec. 26.—Ben Joe Buchanan, Texas ranger, and brother of H. C. Buchanan, former state senator from Snyder, Texas, was shot and killed by two unidentified Mexicans while attending a dance at Polvo, a village in Presidio county, 75 miles south of here Sunday night.

TWO NATIONS (Continued from Page One) ence is regarded as too limited in scope to deal with such questions.

It further appears possible that the difficult question of land armaments could be put forward to the supplemental world assembly on armaments as three years may show changed conditions in Europe which will then admit of agreement to curb arms establishments as well as navies. The project to call another session of the five power naval conference at the end of that period to which begins, first was suggested, it is understood, by the French delegation. At first, the date suggested was 1931, when the decade stop in building ends. Since matters to be discussed then, however, would have to do very largely with replacement building, Lord Lee of the British group, and Secretary Hughes for the American view, are said to have expressed the opinion that the question should be taken up three years before the holiday expires and as it now stands, the meeting would be some time in 1929-29.

Effective in Ten Years It should be recalled that while the "5-5-3" capital ship ratio has been accepted provisionally at least, by the five powers, it does not become effective until the 10 year holiday ends. During the holiday, Great Britain will maintain a 20 per cent larger capital ship force than that of the United States. She has agreed to scale down at the end of that period to an equality with the American fleet, however, and this process cannot be worked out now in detail.

By again going over the ground three years before the holiday ends, however, the method of British reduction can be provided for, even if it does not then seem advisable to provide for further naval reductions all around as the delegates to the conference will permit the building of new ships to displace the old, in rearrangement of tonnage under the "5-5-3" plan.

It is also regarded as altogether probable that in seven years, the present controversy as to relative merits of capital ships and aircraft in war will have cleared up.

Should the predictions of some experts that aircraft eventually will make capital ships useless have been made good during that period, the seven year session of the naval limitation conference could write the development into a new naval agreement contemplating abandonment of the capitals altogether, it is pointed out. In the same way, it could be the case of a new theory of non-competitive naval building in the way of new agencies of warfare which the years have brought to light.

General Vaccaro and the entire military section of the Italian delegation at the Washington conference, will leave Tuesday for New York to sail from there for Italy.

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TOP OF HEAD BLOWN OFF. Oskaloosa, Ia., Dec. 26.—The body of Sam Gruesen, 65, wealthy Mahaska county farmer, was found in a large barn on his son's place Monday. The top of his head had been blown off with a shotgun. No reason is known for his apparent suicide.

ITALIAN STUDENTS at Columbia Plan Gift to University The Association of Italian students at Columbia university is to present to the university, in commemoration of the Dante tercentenary, an Italian House, through which they hope to promote intellectual relations between Italy and the United States.

Fewer Jobless Men in New York, Report New York, Dec. 26.—New York's unemployed numbered 330,015 on December 15, against 343,000 on October 15. This report was made Monday night by the local committee appointed in accordance with recommendations made at the unemployment conference at Washington.
