Stock Market as seen by Bulls & Bears

New York, Dec. 27.—The action of the market today bore out the conviction which gained ground during the days of last week that the list as a general proposition had about witnessed the end of the reaction which set in while ago. Signs were not lacking in the day's turnover that the element which has been responsible for the market's recent rise were desirous of re-maintaining their holdings but it was a noticeable feature that offerings on the whole were CARBON and quotations proved sensitive to even moderate demands. Reports coming to hand covering trading conditions during the current month are rather gratifying. In a good many lines success was attained to be expected of those during the corresponding period last year.

Chicago Market

GRAIN AND PROVISIONS. Chicago, Dec. 27.—Announcement of an increase of the visible supply of wheat, whereas a decrease had been looked for, had a bearish effect on the wheat market today, and so did disturbing gossip as to the government crop report tomorrow. The close was unsettled, 1/4 to 1/2 cents net lower, with May \$1.18 1/2, and July \$1.04 1/2 to \$1.04 3/4. Corn lost 1/4 to 1/2 cent and oats finished 1/4 to 1/2 cent off to 1 cent advance. Provisions, the outcome variable from 2 1/2 cents decline to a rise of 5 cents.

STATE LOSES LEAD IN SALARIES PAID TO SCHOOL TEACHERS

Montana Drops From Fifth to Fourteenth Place, According to Bureau of Education. Butte, Dec. 27.—Although the salaries paid to Butte high school teachers are still among the highest in the country, Montana as a state has dropped from fifth to fourteenth place in the three years from 1918 to 1921, in the matter of the average salary paid to teachers in the four-year high schools in the United States, according to the 1921 report of the bureau of education.

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NEW PETITION WOULD TAKE MORE LAND FROM DEARBORN

Residents Seek to Hold Out Part of Territory Which Divisionists Sought to Have Included; Opposing Forces Arrive for Hearing. Predictions made several weeks ago that the proposed new county of Dearborn would not encounter any opposition were jolted for the second time Tuesday when exclusion petitions from the territory north of Sun River, in Cascade county, were filed in the office of County Clerk John E. Moran by H. E. Kautson of Fort Shaw. The petitions ask for the exclusion of more than half of the territory which inclusion petitions, filed last Saturday, requested to be added to the proposed county. The territory involved in the exclusion petitions covers approximately three townships.
