

of fresh cream. This makes an excellent single luncheon dish.

### Genoa Pumpkin Soup

Peel one small pumpkin then slice and cut it in pieces. Put the pumpkin in a kettle with enough water to cover it, adding a tablespoonful of salt. Cook until the pumpkin is very tender, then put through a puree sieve. Add a quarter cupful of sugar, pepper, salt, a generous lump of butter and a pint of rich milk, reheat and blend well. If too thick add a very little milk. Beat two eggs with one cup of cream. Remove the soup from the fire and stir in the egg and cream mixture, stirring it until the soup is thoroughly smooth and rich. Serve at once.

### Roast Apples

Wash and core six large pippin apples. Prepare a filling of a half cupful each of chopped raisins and dates, a tablespoonful of brown sugar, a half teaspoonful of mixed spice, a quarter cupful of chopped pecan nuts, and enough honey to moisten the mass. Fill the apples, put a large piece of butter on top of each, dust with sugar, set in a pan with a little water in the bottom and bake tender, but do not let them lose their shape. When the apples are cold place on a serving dish and cover them with soft frosting, flavored with lemon juice. Serve with whipped cream or plain cream. This makes quite an elaborate appearing dessert, which may be made early in the morning.

### Apricot Cream


Stew 12 ripe apricots with a quarter pound of sugar and a cupful of water. When the apricots are done add two ounces of gelatine dissolved in a little hot water, and rub the mixture through a sieve. Add a pint of whipped cream to the sauce, turn it into wet mold, and set it on ice to chill and firm. Garnish it with strips of angelica and halved cherries, and serve with flavored cream.
