23. W. RAUSHED FROM PORTLAND; MAY CALTE MILITIA

West Coast Serves Notice on World That It Will Not Interfere With Business; More 100 Arrested as 'Wobblies' Flock to City

Portland, Ore., Oct. 20.—Municipal Portland served notice to the world Friday that it will not tolerate any interference with legitimate business by the I. W. W. in connection with the present waterfront strike. The emphasis was given by Mayor Baker's order of 23 alleged undesirable to the city limits and ordered them to keep moving, this being the vanguard of the crowd, and without exception the city jail are to be served in the same manner as soon as the necessary preliminaries can be arranged in the municipal court, it was announced. Any deported agitator who returns will be picked up immediately, it was said. Of the more than 200 alleged I. W. W. rounded up in the recent police drive a majority were able to prove that they have not been in the city for more than six months. Those who have been here for a less time were given the option of leaving town or serving 90 days on the rock pile, and without exception all have elected to get out of the city.

Though the city does not look for any trouble in enforcing its program, the mayor Friday sent a telegram to Governor O'Leary asking that the adjutant general be detailed to Portland to keep in touch with developments and be ready at a minute's notice to order out the national guard if such an extreme measure should prove necessary to cope with the situation. A reply from the governor's office stated that Adjutant General White will be ordered to Portland as soon as he returns from a trip to southern Oregon, where he is at present.

A telegram was received by the mayor from the general defense committee at Chicago warning him that arresting men merely because they happen to belong to this organization, in the committee's opinion, is a situation in answer to this the mayor sent a message apprising the committee of what has been done already and advising it, if it would

300 STUDENTS FACE SUSPENSION; BATTLE ON CAMPUS FURIOUS

California University Chaps 'In Bad' Over Riot; One Injured.

Los Angeles, Oct. 20.—Three hundred or more students of the University of Southern California and of the University of California, southern branch, Friday night faced suspension or possible expulsion as a result of an inter-university riot on the campus of the southern branch Friday. More than 200 police and firemen responded to riot calls, a score of students were injured and Roger Vargas, 18, a student at southern branch, was in a hospital after an examination disclosed he had suffered a dislocated vertebra. Explanations of the riot differ.

A great pile of wood had been collected on the campus at the southern branch, for a bonfire to celebrate a possible victory over Occidental college at football here Saturday.

One story was that southern branch students sent a note to the students of the University of Southern California defying the Trojans to set fire to the wood pile.

INDICTMENT REPORTED IN DUAL MURDER

Hall Home Guarded by State Troopers; 'Eye Witness' Discovered.

Extreme Secrecy Covers Acts of Prosecutors; Death Clothing Shown

New Brunswick, Oct. 20.—On the heels of unconfirmed reports that the grand jury of Somerset county Friday had returned an indictment in the Hall-Mills murder mystery, the investigation was given a sensational twist Friday night when it was officially learned that an eye witness to the double shooting, a woman of reputable character in New Brunswick, had been discovered.

The interjection of this new phase in the already greatly complicated case, was said to have been responsible for the sudden turn in the activity of Prosecutor Asariah Beekman, who appeared before the grand jury at Somerville.

Reporters See Death Clothes

PROBE OF HAZING MAY INCLUDE MORE SENIOR 'MIDDIES'

Trial Discloses More Than One Was in Room Where Youth Was Injured.

Annapolis, Md., Oct. 20.—That the hazing investigation now under way at the naval academy is likely to assume a much wider range, involving other midshipmen of the senior class, was indicated by the trend of testimony given before the naval court-martial when it resumed its sessions Friday in the trial of Bruce R. Robinson, of Chandler, Arizona, whose hazing of William H. McGregor, of Bremerton, Wash., member of the fourth class, was alleged to have been the cause of a fatal case.

Three additional midshipmen, Joseph F. Fitzgerald, of New York; Nevett Steele, at large, and Calvin H. Mann, of Colorado, all first class men, were mentioned in the day's testimony as having been in Robinson's room while the hazing of McGregor was in progress and called before the court they declined to answer questions on the ground of incrimination.

CONTROL OF GERMANY ADVOCATED BY FRANCE TO PAY REPARATIONS

International Committee Suggested to Take Hold of Economic Phase in Effort to Put Country on Solid Footing.

Paris, Oct. 20.—(By The Associated Press.)—Complete and rigid control of all German finances, power to veto the expenditures and regulate taxation and authority to dictate the arrangement of budgets of the various German states are among the chief proposals contained in the plan of the French government for a solution of Germany's financial difficulties and for placing that country in a position to meet her reparations payments.

DIVISION OF PROFIT IN STOCK DEFENDED BY TREASURY CHIEF

400 Per Cent Stock Dividend of Standard Oil Not Illegal, He Says.

Washington, Oct. 20.—Secretary Mellon, replying Friday night to a letter from Representative Frear, of Wisconsin, republican member of the house ways and means committee, declared there had been and will be no laxity on the part of the treasury in enforcing section 220 of the last revenue act which Mr. Frear described as providing methods "for reaching the holders of surplus stock when held for the purpose of evading taxation."

Mr. Frear referred in his letter to reports that the Standard Oil company of New Jersey would issue a 400 per cent stock dividend and announced his intention of leading a fight to make income tax returns public in order, as he said, to close up "escape sluiceways."

26 NABBED BY U. S. FOR PART IN HUGE BOND THEFT PLOTS

Minneapolis, Oct. 20.—Twenty-six persons including bankers, bond salesmen, and three or four newspaper men have been indicted by the federal grand jury, charged with implication in nationwide bond thefts. LaFayette French, United States district attorney, announced Friday.

BLAST IN MINE KILLS 8; U. S. STARTS PROBE

One Missing, Four Hurt in Explosion in Coal Shaft; Gas Is Cause.

Rescue Squad in Search of Miner Not Accounted for After Mishap.

McCurain, Okla., Oct. 20.—With eight dead and one other miner missing as the result of a gas explosion which wrecked mine No. 2 of the Progressive Coal company, near here, Friday, steps were under way night by federal and state officials for a thorough investigation of the cause of the blast.

ELECTION IN BRITAIN LOOKS; IRISH TREATY TO STAND, IS BELIEF

Achievement of Lloyd George Government in Bringing Peace to Erin Expected to Be Upheld by New Administration; Ex-Premier Draws Political Sword in Battle for His Policies.

London, Oct. 20.—(By The Associated Press.)—In the still highly speculative political situation Friday night, only two facts stood out as definite—that there will be almost immediately a general election and that parliamentary ratification of the Irish constitution is assured.

Andrew Bonar Law, who is to lead the new government, which will take the place of that of David Lloyd George in the event of a general election, confirmed his intention to advise King George to dissolve parliament immediately and added that this fact would give ample time to deal with the Irish legislation.
