GOLD DIGGERS PLEASES FIRST NIGHT CROWDS

Comedy Vividly Portrays Life of Chorus Girls in New York.

"The Gold Diggers," which opened a three-night engagement at the Grand theater Sunday, has for its main purpose that of creating laughter and it attains this end admirably.

The comedy brings into view a fascinating group of New York chorus girls, together with their male admirers, and leads them through a maze of merry complications.

Of the group concerned in the play there is one—Jerry Lamar, played by Gertrude Vanderbilt—whose ambitions rise above the mere getting of money, and it is around her exploits in advancing the love affairs of a friend—Violet Dwyer, played by Winnifred Barry—that the plot is built.


There is not a little true ring in the sentiment in the comedy but this serves chiefly to bring the humor of the story in higher relief.

Miss Vanderbilt is distinctively clever as Jerry Lamar. Her role demands versatility and she meets that demand with full measure.

G. O. P. Have Control of State Assembly, Says Miles City Man

Miles City, Mont., Nov. 12.—(By The Associated Press.)—That the campaign waged in the state of Montana just closed had more angles than any remembered in recent years and that the state legislature is safely republican in both branches, despite the loss of the head of the ticket, is the opinion advanced by J. D. Scanlan, chairman of the state republican committee who returned to his home here Saturday.

"The next state legislature will not alone support the program of Governor Dixon," said Mr. Scanlan, "for a number of democrats have been elected who are known to be staunch supporters of the governor's policies."

"This measure," he said, "was carried against the concerted opposition of a most powerful political machine and Governor Dixon gained the most signal victory ever given to a chief executive of the state."
