TEACHERS NAME DELEGATES FOR HELENA MEET

Certification of Instructors to Be Important Task at Session.

Teachers who will represent the Great Falls schools at the state meeting of the Teachers' association in Helena, November 27-29, were named at a meeting at the Junior high school Tuesday evening. They are: S. D. Largent, superintendent of schools; Bruce E. Millikin, principal of Central high school; Clara Christensen, principal of the Lowell school; Leta Thompson of the Junior high school; Anne Houston of Central high school; Winnifred Sheel of the Washington school; and Estelle Ryan of the Whitaker building.

Certification of teachers will be one of the most important legislative matters to be taken up at the convention. Principal Millikin told the members of the local teachers' association at the meeting. Proposed uniform legislation that will govern the issuance of certificates to rural teachers will be discussed and acted upon at the convention, he said. Under the proposed plan two certificates will be offered. One will be issued for elementary work and if the teacher proves successful, she will be granted for a five-year period. High school certificates will call for higher requirements than those required for the lower grades.

Great Falls Leads Entire Nation in Postal Deposits

(Tribune's Washington Bureau.) Washington, Nov. 15.—Great Falls leads all cities of the nation for the greatest percentage in increase of postal savings deposits for October, with a total of \$171,228 for the month, according to reports received Wednesday from every city in the country with deposits of \$100,000 or more.

The increase reported by Great Falls shows October deposits exceeded those of September by \$54,768, or nearly 40 per cent, and resulted in the office jumping from ninety-second to sixty-ninth place in amount of deposits. Great Falls leads many of the larger cities of the nation, such as Akron, Ohio; Indianapolis, Ind.; Rochester, N. Y.; Spokane, Wash., and Youngstown, Ohio.

Mild Flu Epidemic Hits Great Falls

If there isn't a widespread epidemic of influenza here, there is a "sort of" one that is resulting in considerable misery on the part of the victims, according to the statement of a number of the city's physicians Wednesday. They reported attending a number of patients, who are ill enough to be confined to their homes, but stated they are not seriously ill.

No influenza has been reported at the city and county health office and only a few cases of pneumonia. At the Columbus and Deaconess hospitals, there are several pneumonia and influenza patients, all of whom are recovering.

Dr. G. A. Fuson, city and county health officer, says that the present epidemic is of a mild form of flu and that while there is no reason for alarm, the public should take the necessary precautions to prevent it from spreading.

Bresee Urges Boys Consider Fathers as Friend and Pal
