Montana Oil Field News

ADAMS LAND COMPANY WELL BROUGHT IN AT 1,660 FEET

200 Feet of Oil Standing in Hole; Drill Left Touching Sand in North Part of Kevin-Sunburst.

The farthest north of recent completions in the Kevin-Sunburst field, the well of the Adams Land Company, drilled on the southeast corner of section 31-36-2, was brought in late Wednesday afternoon, according to the report received by R. M. Adams, secretary-treasurer and field manager of the company, who was in Great Falls at the time. The well was brought in at 1,660 feet and 200 feet of oil was standing in the hole at the time the report was telephoned to Adams at Great Falls a short time later. The drill had just touched the sand, delaying drilling in until Adams reaches the well. He left on the night train for the field. There is 140 feet of open hole and Adams said that the well will be underreamed and casing carried to the cap rock before drilling in.

Contract Well The well was drilled under contract by George Day on the 320-acre lease held by the Adams Oil company and is one of eight wells to be drilled by that company on the lease. For future operations, the company plans to bring in one or more strings of its own tools.

SHOT FORCES UP PRODUCTION OF RIEBE WELL

35 Barrels of Oil Pumped in Five Hours Following Blast.

The Homestake-Riebe well on section 3-35-2 W., pumped 35 barrels of oil in five hours on the initial pumping of the well, according to a report received by Julius C. Peters of Great Falls, president of the Homestake Exploration, owner of the well.

The results from the pumping of the Riebe well are considered important as showing the results of shooting wells in the Kevin-Sunburst field under similar conditions. Riebe, offset to the original Sunburst well in this part of the field, on section 34-36-2 W., was drilled through the Kootenai with little more than a showing of oil. Drilling through to the Madison failed to show production in the Ellis and the well was bridged back to the Kootenai in the Sunburst sand, when a small charge was given to enlarge the hole. A larger charge was set off in cleaning out the hole after a cave-in had buried the charge. There was 100 quarts of nitroglycerin in the charge and it placed the hole in a condition that made immediate cleaning out impossible.

The well was cleaned out a short time ago and casing set on the cap rock. While the well will be pumped, the well will not be connected with the pipe line but will be stored on the field.

Two Oil Permits Issued by Bennett

Two oil and gas permits were received Wednesday at the office of W. E. Bennett, register and special disbursing agent for the land office. The permits were to Owen E. Strecker of Conrad, 400 acres in sections 11 and 14-29-2 W.; and Milton K. Loyal of Great Falls, 521 acres in township 30 north, range 2 and 3 west. DAMAGES—14.

A right of way for the Belt-Riceville federal aid road across seven acres of land on two farms damaged by the two permits to the extent of \$502.90, a condemnation board decided Wednesday, according to Deputy County Attorney Julius Wuerthner. The board today will sign a report to this effect, which will be submitted to the district court. The land in question is between Armstrong and Riceville, a part of the Joe Weigand and James Cooper farms.

Attachment Case in District Court Held Until Today

Trial in a district court attachment case was discontinued Wednesday afternoon until this morning, points of law at issue being considered by Judge J. B. Leslie in the meantime. The case is that of G. B. Allen, et al., vs. the Northern Brokerage company. O'Leary & Doyle represent the plaintiff and McKenzie & McKenzie the defendant firm. A damage suit brought by the Royal Milling company against the director general of railroads was dismissed by Judge H. H. Ewing as settled.

A verdict in favor of the defendant was awarded by Judge Leslie in the case of the First National bank of Shelby against the Bottineau county bank, after the case had been gone into by the court. The plaintiff was not represented. The case involved clearing of a half section of Toole county land of a lien of something under \$1,000, and dates back about nine years.

Low Rates Offered for Scottish Rite Reunion at Helena

A round trip rate of a fare and a half is announced by General Agent J. S. Bock of the Great Northern for the Scottish Rite reunion and Mystic Shrine ceremonial, which takes place at Helena the week of December 4 to 9. This rate is obtainable upon presentation of identification certificates to ticket agents at the time of purchase of tickets. \$1.00 is the minimum excursion fare which can be obtained. Tickets will be sold December 2 to December 8, inclusive, with December 14 stated as the return date limit. The tariff applies from all points in Montana.

STONE ENTERS AS DEFENDANT LIQUOR CASE

Will Play Lone Hand Today With Continuance Expected.

R. E. Stone is the only defendant in a liquor case scheduled for hearing in district court today. The case has twice been continued and it is likely that a move for continuance will be made in Judge J. B. Leslie's department today, when it comes on for trial. Stone, who was arrested in a big raid on the same time that the oil possibilities are prospected. Adams said that, according to the results in the Adams well, and especially the heavy gas flow at 900 feet, there should be a good chance for gas production at Sunburst. The company is a Minneapolis organization headed by J. H. Adams and backed by Minneapolis and St. Paul business men. R. M. Adams telegraphed to Adams and his associates and Adams and probably other members of the company are expected to leave for the field at once.

In the Kevin-Sunburst well, only a slight showing of oil and gas was found in the Sunburst sand of the Kootenai. The heavy gas flow was struck at 900 feet and this will be utilized in the future drilling operations of the company.

New Territory The well is one of the most important of the recent completions in the field, as it opens a territory about two and a quarter miles northwest of the Mid-Northern well on the Dawson-Merkle tract in section 9-35-2 W., and improves the character of this area, which had been looked upon with some skepticism by oil men since the drilling of the Shafer well in the eastern part of section 33-36-2 W., two miles east of the Adams well. The results in this well were taken to mean that perhaps oil men who had come to view the north line of township 35, west of the Shafer as the edge of production marked by such wells as the Gladys Belle, Mid-Northern and Hogan, may again have guessed wrong on the Kevin-Sunburst field. It is anticipated that this well, if drilling in, meets the present expectations, will mean extending the prospecting to the northwest.

The well is also viewed as having some bearing on the drilling planned at Sunburst, where an attempt is to be made to obtain gas for the town at the same time that the oil possibilities are prospected. Adams said that, according to the results in the Adams well, and especially the heavy gas flow at 900 feet, there should be a good chance for gas production at Sunburst. FAVERO FONUD GUILTY; MUST SUPPORT BABY

Court Orders Butte Man to Pay \$30 Per Month to Helena Girl.

Jack Favero, formerly of Great Falls but now of Butte, is the father of the four-month-old baby of Irene Roselle, a district court jury decided in short order Wednesday after hearing her side of the case. Favero was not in court and was not represented by counsel. The case was heard in Judge J. B. Leslie's department. Deputy County Attorney Julius Wuerthner representing the state, Judge Leslie Wednesday afternoon issued a decree directing Favero to pay \$30 a month for the support of the child.

Miss Roselle, who is taking a training course for nurses at the Florence Crittenden home at Helena, appeared in court with Mrs. Lena M. Cullom, superintendent of the home and with the baby. The mother of the child told of meeting Favero here in August, 1921. The child was born at the Crittenden home on July 10.

Favero, at the time of his alleged relations with the woman, was employed at a Great Falls restaurant. He is said to be living at the present time with his wife at Butte. The county attorney's office was interested in the case because if the paternity of the child was not established it would probably become a ward of charity, according to records filed in the case. Several efforts were made to settle the affair out of court, at conferences held at the office of the county attorney, but Favero elected to fight the case. The complaint against Favero was filed last spring, an answer denying all charges later being filed by his attorneys, Freeman, Thelen & Frary.

NEW WAITE OIL WELL SHOWING GOOD PROMISE

Drillers Sink Casing Through Ten Feet of Sand; Strike Flow.

The well of the Waite Oil company on section 24-35-2 W. is regarded as one of the good wells of that part of the field and is probably 25 per cent better than the Sunburst-Zimmerman well in section 23-35-2 W., according to L. C. Stevenson, president of the Sunburst Oil & Gas company who returned from the field Wednesday.

While the well had not been drilled in at the time he was on the ground, the indications were good, Stevenson said. He said that after he reached Shelby, he received a report that the well had been drilled in 10 feet into the sand and oil men believed it to be, conservatively, from 60 to 100 barrels production.

"It is a better well than the Zimmerman because production is coming from a real sand," said Stevenson. "I inspected the sand and it appeared to be good. The production in the Zimmerman is coming from lime formation. If the well was drilled in 10 feet, that shows a fair thickness of the sand."

The Ohio-Berg gasser in section 17-35-2 W. is now virtually under control, Stevenson said. He said that the control head has been placed on the casing and the gas has been shut off as much as is practicable.

The Ohio-Sunburst-Thornton well in section 17-35-2 W., diagonal offset to the Gladys Belle on section 18, was not of commercial production in the same horizon, Stevenson said. He reported that the well was shot Tuesday but the result had not been determined.

The water situation has been growing more serious with colder weather and it is probable that after the next three weeks no drilling other than the most necessary will be done in the field. Although there are some large reservoirs, these are at a distance from present drilling operations and the expense of laying pipe and burying it to prevent freezing is too great to be undertaken at this time. Hauling water has difficulties in freezing and it is too expensive to fit up steam plants for melting ice. The labor situation is not good in cold weather, he said, it being difficult to keep men on the job after the cold weather sets in.
