A FATHER TESTIFIES FOR HIS SON FOR FORGERY.—We remember to have witnessed a tender scene in court than one which occurred in the City Court yesterday morning. J. I. Foster was presented by J. I. Foster, Judge Craig, upon a charge of forgery, having forged a check on the Citizens' Bank, and another on the Second National Bank, each for \$500, purporting to be signed by R. J. Foster & Co., wholesale grocers on Main Street, between Eighth and Ninth. The two checks on the Citizens' Bank were passed on Stratton's Bank, and the one on the National Bank on the Superior House. The first witness on the stand was R. J. Foster, father of the accused, who testified that the checks were forgeries. When asked if he had not paid similar checks for his son, he replied, bursting into tears, that he had paid for a year \$5,000 and \$18,000 for him. The father of the old man could stand no longer, being compelled to thus publicly rebuke the faults of his son. The court, as the stout man testified, like an infant, was most sad. Judge Craig, after making some appropriate remarks on the conduct of the father, required him to give an answer.—Louisville
